BACKGROUND

Nebraska Environmental Trust Board First Quarter Meeting Thursday, February 2, 2023 1:30 p.m.

1. Call to Order

Chairman Quandahl called the first quarter meeting of the Nebraska Environmental Trust Board to order at 1:32 p.m. in LL Room 031 at 245 Fallbrook Blvd, Lincoln, Nebraska.

Advanced notice of the meeting and public hearing was published in the Lincoln Journal Star on January 23, 2023. The agenda and documents to be considered at the meeting were provided. The Open Meetings Act was posted near the entrance of the meeting room and on the Nebraska Environmental Trust (NET) website.

Roll call was conducted, and a quorum was present.

2. Consent Agenda

Background on consent agenda items

The consent agenda included the January 10, 2023, Board meeting minutes, financial reports and approval to set financials aside for audit, the Grant Disbursement Report, Nebraska Lottery Proceeds Allocation Report, and the Grant Administration Report.

3. Public Comment

Mr. Jerry Bucy, Lower Big Blue NRD, explained the reasons for the extension request for grant project 20-162-3.

Mr. John Bender, Friends of the Nebraska Environmental Trust, provided his opinion as to whether specific projects were regulatory and therefore ineligible for funding in response to discussion held at the previous NET Board meeting.

4. Board Development

a. Recognition of Board Representation in Congressional Districts

Chairman Quandahl recognized the public service of Board members John Orr, Congressional District I; Quentin Bowen, Congressional District 3; and Paul Dunn, Congressional District 2, whose terms expire in March 2023. John Orr and Quentin Bowen have each served one six-year term, and Paul Dunn has served four six-year terms.

b. Accountability and Disclosure - Conflicts of Interest Statement & Reporting

Executive Director Elmshaeuser noted members of the Nebraska Environmental Trust Board are bound by the Nebraska Accountability and Disclosure Act. Members are required to file a Statement of Financial Interests form by March 1 and file a Potential Conflict of Interest Statement whenever any potential conflict of interest arises. Board members were encouraged to sign a NET Conflict of Interest form to acknowledge avoiding or disclosing potential conflicts of interest or any perceptions of them.

5. Legislative Committee Report

Executive Director Elmshaeuser reported 812 bills were introduced in the Nebraska Legislature. No bills or constitutional amendment proposals were identified that directly impact the NET. Legislative bills that may affect board activities include:

- LB302 concerns accountability and disclosure laws and how conflicts of interest are reported
- LB513 changes proof of publication requirements for legal notices and requirements for published notices and virtual conferencing under the Open Meetings Act
- LB637 would require members of the public to be allowed to speak at each meeting subject to the Open Meetings Act

6. Rescind Nebraska Environmental Trust Policy Section VI: G. Defense Funds on Easements

Background on Agenda item 6

In July 2015, the NET Board implemented a policy to require a defense of easements fund by grantees if a conservation easement was part of a grant request. Defense Funds are not held by the NET and are set aside by the grantee after NET funds are provided for the awarded grant. The NET does not monitor these funds. Survivability clauses require the grantee in their grant contract to report the funds annually. In most cases, the NET staff request and track the information. NET Board discussions during 2022 involved the NET's State APA Audit issued on July 21, 2021, and the similarities of a revolving fund situation. The Defense Funds on Easements policy sets a position in which the NET Board is at risk of delegating its authority to fund activities without ensuring outside oversight by either the Board or any other independent entity. Under the current policy, interest gained from the funds may be expended by the grantee for monitoring. The funds are to be tracked

for each funded property. In most cases, the grantee has blended the funds into one investment fund. If there is a conflict concerning the easement, the grantee could use the funds provided by the NET to counter NET challenges.

Motion by Mr. Andersen, seconded by Mr. Orr, "I move that the Nebraska Environmental Trust Board rescinds the Nebraska Environmental Trust Policy Section VI: G. Defense Funds on Easements effective February 3, 2023, and that all surviving contractual obligations by previous grantees continue to report the status of defense fund on easements, interest, and allowed expenditures."

7. Amend Nebraska Environmental Trust Policy Section VII: A. Post-Completion Procedure and Report to align with Grant Modification Request Policy

Background on Agenda Item 7

NET policy Section VII: A. Post-Completion Procedure and Report was adopted on February 13, 1996, and last revised on April 5, 2007. NET policy Section VI: Grantee Conditions, I. Grant modification Requests was adopted on November 13, 2006, and later amended on April 8, 2021. Conflicting language must be deleted in Section VII to match the updated Section VI.

Motion by Mr. Andersen, seconded by Mr. Orr, "I move that the NET Policy Section VII: Post-Completion Procedure and Report, A. be amended by removing the language that is struck through and read as follows:

A grant contract is considered to have expired when the termination date specified in that contract is reached. The Board authorizes the Executive Director to extend the termination date of any grant, provided that the grantee supplies reasonable cause for the extension and the extension will allow the project to be completed as authorized by the Board in the grant award."

Discussion: Mr. Orr stated he supported the policy change since it clarifies authority, holds the Board accountable, and is more transparent.

8. Discussion on limiting survivability terms for insurance, property tax, and easements on grant-funded projects

Background on Agenda Item 8

The continued payment of real property tax is included in Title 137. The NET policy on payment of taxes on real property originated in 1999 and was updated in 2005. Initially drafted in 1996, the equipment insurance policy was revised in 2002 and 2022. These policies create survivability provisions in the grant contracts. Depreciation timelines and monitoring of personal and real property create accountability issues.

Executive Director Karl Elmshaeuser stated input from the NET Board is being sought to create recommendations to the Title 137 Committee and NET Board to update rules, regulations, and policies. Decisions could enable the incorporation of language into grant contracts and separate contractual agreements beyond the grant contract for specific items. As a result, clearer tracking and accountability of expended public funds can be provided. Examples of cases with accountability issues were outlined for the Board. Personal property is easier to track than real property. Questions for the NET Board's consideration include the following:

- What is the term for an environmental benefit to the general public from the public funds invested?
- How do we handle real property, and what is the length of the term for real property?
- How long after the Trust provides funds are the obligations fulfilled, and how long should strings be attached to a grant?
- Does the Trust care if the property doubles in value over time?
- What is the general public's benefit, and how is it quantified?

Part of the Title 137 Committee's challenge will be defining whether a program is regulatory. Currently, there are no provisions in Title 137 to track funds once they go back to the grantee.

9. Grant Modification Requests

a. Extension Requests: 20-162-3, 20-183-3, 21-162-2, 22-141, 21-118

Motion by Mr. McCoy, seconded by Mr. Hellbusch, "I move to approve Lower Big Blue NRD's request to extend project 20-162-3 for one year."

Discussion: Mr. Andersen expressed concern about what the extension would produce for the grant and whether it would finish spending the funds or finish the project. Mr. Kanger questioned whether it is best to surrender the funds, return to the Trust, and reapply when timing and other funding source challenges exist on a project.

Discussion: Mr. Andersen requested a review of the modification request before considering the extension request. Grants Administrator Adams noted the modification request was due to burglary and vandalism at one of the sites. Excess money in the Benefits budget category due to the revised eligibility policy could be moved to the Materials and Supplies and Equipment categories. Equipment insurance is required for items worth \$1,000 or more. Since the individual pieces were considered materials, service life was not added to the equipment. Issues with receiving equipment and materials caused the project's timeline delay.

Discussion: Bidding and construction on the project cannot proceed until NEPA regulatory and FHWA approvals are received. Pending progress with NGPC and FWHS, the current estimate for completion is November 2023.

Discussion: It was clarified that there was an agreement in the project to allow public access for a term of five years after the completion of the project. Due to severe drought, a permit could not be obtained for mechanical cedar clearing unless fire equipment and personnel were on-site. As the requirement was cost prohibitive, the project was delayed until a snowfall occurred. A subsequent snowstorm resulted in drifts four to six feet deep, making work impossible. NET policy does not prohibit a second extension on a project.

Discussion: As per NET Board policy, requests for budget changes within a grant must be approved by the Board if the total amount is \$10,000 or more. An excess amount remains in the Benefits category due to the new contract limitations and is ineligible for recapturing unless an eligible request is made.

10. Title 137 Committee Report

Chairman Josh Andersen of the Title 137 Committee reported public listening sessions for proposed changes to Title 137 were held in Lincoln, Omaha, Kearney, and a virtual Zoom session was made available. The Committee is reviewing the report of compiled comments. After the review, the Committee will bring ideas to the NET Board for consideration. Title 137 Committee members include Committee Chairman Josh Andersen, Jeff Kanger, Mark Quandahl, Jim Macy, and Sherry Vinton.

Executive Director Elmshaeuser reported the Committee met on February 1, 2023, and will continue to meet every two weeks. Board members were encouraged to submit ideas to the Title 137 Committee for consideration.

11. Directors Report

Executive Director Elmshaeuser reported that ten grant project audits had been conducted in the last eight months, including four in-person and four ongoing audits. Eighteen 15-day notices were sent to grantees for a breach of their grant contract. Fifteen of the eighteen notices have been cleared, and three are ongoing. One grantee in the audit process is under federal indictment. On another issue, a grantee has been criminally charged and is still pending investigation. Two other grant projects are still being researched. Internally, tracking processes for grants have been improved. The office is in the process of updating contracts for the next grant round. Language will be added to the grant contract stating that invoices not submitted by a specified date will not be paid.

Other items in the report included:

- The Appropriations Hearing with the Game and Parks Commission, which includes the Governor's proposed biennial budget recommendations for the NET in LB814, will be held at the State Capitol, Room 1524, on Tuesday, February 28.
- At the next quarterly meeting, UN-L's School of Computing students will present their Grants Portal improvements to the NET Board.

Executive Director Elmshaeuser formally recognized Holly Adams and Sandra Weaver for their service to the State of Nebraska and for carrying the load while the office remains understaffed. Both employees were awarded a \$1,000 bonus for their service.

Board Member Comment

Mr. Christen asked to clarify his comments on regulatory programs at the NET Board meeting on January 10, 2023. He noted the comments were based on his impression that Trust-funded grants in the past were not allowed to be used on CRP acres when related to burn equipment and evasive species control. Participants already received payments for management practices on their CRP acres through FSA.

From the State of Nebraska Auditor of Public Accounts, Attestation Report dated July 21, 2021. During our examination of the Nebraska Environmental Trust Board (Board), we noted certain deficiencies and other operational matters that are presented here. The following comment is required to be reported in accordance with Government Auditing Standards: Comment #1, "Grants Monitoring," which is considered to be a significant deficiency

From the NET Board minutes dated July 22, 2021.

Mr. Davidson asked Ms. Kucera to educate the Board on the structure of the rating system. Ms. Kucera responded that findings called "Other" are brought to the attention of governance. This would include Item 2 (Unallowed Endowment Transfer). The next level of a finding would be a "Significant Deficiency" which is an internal control deficiency or a combination of internal control deficiencies that definitely need to come to the attention of governance. It is unlikely to have material impact on financial statements. This would include Item 1 (Grants Monitoring).

Mr. Quandahl thanked Ms. Kucera for her time and efforts in putting together the report. It provided clarity on how the Board is doing on financial and accounting matters. Ms. Kucera was asked in her opinion if NET possessed sufficient resources and staff to address the grant monitoring recommendations. Ms. Kucera responded that she did not know if she was equipped to answer, although she did believe the number of projects was too numerous for a four member staff to do the required financial audits on all the projects. Many state agencies conduct sub-recipient monitoring, but the difference is they are not really audits. The Board may want to clarify what is meant by "audit" and narrow down the procedures in the rules and regulations.

Mr. Christen questioned whether site visits in the audit were referring to all funded projects. Ms. Kucera responded the assumption was correct, since audits are required in the Board's procedures and policies. Mr. Christen stated the issues are long term and monitoring and following up on these projects has probably been deficient for a long time. Board and staff support was lacking to move forward and do something about it. Mr. Christen added that in an effort to be fair to the public and to be transparent, the audit had certainly been helpful.

Mr. Wellman confirmed with Ms. Kucera that contracted audits were acceptable.

EXPLANATION

The Trust 22 Committee worked with the Nebraska Center for Operational Excellence (COE) staff to improve the NET processes and operated within the statutes, bylaws, rules & regulation, as well as current NET policy parameters.

Grants monitoring was a significant separate project to undertake. As a result of the COE sessions, it was determined that using the existing resources of the NET Grants Portal would provide a suitable platform to input, track and notify parties involved concerning monitoring of grants.

After meeting with NET's Grants Portal Software principal, it was determined that a good course of action would be to look to the UNL School of Computing's Senior Design Capstone Program for assistance. The initial correspondence began in June of 2022. Both Gregoire Consulting and the UNL Capstone Program were contractually engaged to undertake the project. The UNL Team was determined in August of 2022.

Marie Gregoire, Holly Adams and the UNL Team have been meeting on a regular basis to find the right solutions for NET. They are here today to present their significant achievement.

Presentation by UN-L Students on their project to update the NET Grants Portal. Implementation and Beta Testing of the system through June 30, 2023. Contract services for availability of outside inspectors starting in July of 2023.

BACKGROUND

Nebraska State Statute 81-15,173.

Board; powers and duties.

The board shall have and may exercise the following powers and duties:

- (2) Keep records, conduct hearings, and adopt and promulgate rules and regulations to carry out its duties and implement the Nebraska Environmental Trust Act;
- (7) Establish ad hoc advisory boards and subcommittees;

EXPLANATION

Title 137 covers the Rules and Regulations Governing Activities of the Nebraska Environmental Trust. They were last amended May 8, 2018.

During the Trust 22 Committee's work with the Center of Operational Excellence, several issues were discovered that required additional efforts to resolve. One of the key issues was defining eligibility. It was recommended to establish a dedicated ad hoc committee to work over the next year to further identity, propose and resolve these issues through the formal process to amend Title 137. The committee was established on May 19, 2022. A brief history is attached. The attached amendment is the culmination of all of those efforts. Written testimony provided before the Public Hearing is also attached.

If the NET Board approves the proposed amendments, the document will be sent to the Attorney General's office for review. If approved by the AG's office, the document will be sent to the Governor's office for review. If approved by the Governor, the document will be sent to the Secretary of State's office for processing.

PROPOSAL

Recommended motion, "I move to adopt the amendments to Title 137 as proposed, to authorize the Executive Director to sign the Certification of Adoption, and forward the applicable and appropriate documents for processing as required."

The changes are being proposed as a response to a culmination of almost two years of effort by a number of people inside and outside of the Nebraska Environmental Trust (NET). Regulations are adopted in order to clarify and define processes and requirements outlined in state law. When a regulation restated a state statue, it was removed from Title 137 as the state statute is sufficient.

The State Audit of NET from July of 2021 identified areas for improvement. The Operational Assessment of NET in July of 2021 by the Department of Administrative Services identified multiple findings that included lack of clarity and consistency in grant administration. Key factors were eligibility, rating, and ranking of grant applications. There were also property tax concerns and implications from grant funding that needed to be addressed.

The NET established the Trust 22 Committee and requested assistance from the Nebraska Center of Operational Excellence to assist with NET's process improvements. As a result of those efforts, at least twelve items in the current Title 137 Rules and Regulations for NET were identified for additional efforts to resolve those issues.

In May of 2022 the NET Board created the Title 137 Committee to focus on the review of Title 137 over the next year to determine and recommend procedures, policies and efficiencies as well as alignment with state statutes of Title 137 to the NET Board. After elections of officers in August of 2022, the Title 137 Committee members were appointed in September of 2022, to begin their work.

The Title 137 Committee's first meeting in September of 2022 established a process to complete the task in accordance with the Nebraska Secretary of State steps for rules and regulations promulgation. The first decision was to conduct listening sessions in each Congressional districts prior to proposing any changes to the rules and regulations.

The first listening session was held in Congressional District 1 in October of 2022. The second listening session was held in District 2 in November of 2022. The third listening session was held in District 3 in November of 2022. A fourth listening session was held in December of 2022 and was offered as a Zoom meeting for anyone who could not attend a session in person. Also, written comments were submitted to the Title 137 Committee.

All written comments and summaries of the listening sessions were provided to the Title 137 Committee. The Committee met on six different occasions between January and March of 2023 to discuss potential changes to Title 137.

The next step is a public hearing on the proposed changes that will be held on May 4, 2023. A public notice was published as required and a press release was provided. The NET Board may take action on the proposed language after the public hearing process has been completed.

CHAPTER 1 - SCOPE OF ACTIVITIES

001. CONFLICT OF INTEREST.

<u>001.01</u> <u>AGENCY DIRECTOR ABSTENTIONS.</u> Any board member who is also a director of a state agency shall abstain from voting on applications where more than 50% of the value of grant award accrues to the agency as primary, tangible benefits. Grant funds administered by the agency and passed through to other grant recipients are not considered to accrue value to the agency.

CHAPTER 2 - ENDOWMENT FUND

<u>001.</u> <u>SOLICITATION OF GIFTS, GRANTS, BEQUESTS, ROYALTIES AND DONATIONS</u>. The Board may establish a fundraising plan and may review the plan at least annually. No solicitation of gifts, grants, bequests, royalties or donations will be conducted outside of this plan, without approval of the Board.

002. RECEIPT OF GIFTS, GRANTS, BEQUESTS, ROYALTIES AND DONATIONS.

<u>002.01</u> The Board may accept any gift, grant, bequest, royalty or donation specifically designated for restricted purposes or projects which fall within the scope and purpose of the Nebraska Environmental Trust Act, except that the Board will not accept title to or legal interest in real property. The Board may establish a dollar value below which it will not accept specifically designated gifts. The Board may refuse any gift, grant, quest, royalty or donation at its sole discretion. The Board shall seek approval by the Governor of any gift or bequest of personal property in excess of \$10,000.00.

<u>002.02</u> The Board may establish policies for the management of assets credited to the Funds subject to provisions of statute. Before adopting such policies, the Board shall hold at least one public meeting where the public is offered the opportunity to comment on the policies.

<u>002.03</u> Gifts of cash, including bank notes, checks, money orders, currency or other legal tender will be credited to the Fund designated by the donor, if any. If the donor does not designate a Fund, the gift will be credited to the Endowment Fund.

<u>002.04</u> The value of gifts other than cash will be credited to the Fund designated by the donor, if any. If the donor does not designate a fund, the gift will be credited to the Endowment Fund.

<u>002.05</u> The Executive Director, on behalf of the Trust, may accept any gift of cash broadly designated for the purposes of the Trust. The Executive Director will not accept any specifically designated or restricted gift of cash or any gift other than cash without prior approval of the Board or a committee designated by the Board to act in its stead.

003. ALLOCATION OF RECEIPTS AND PROCEEDS.

<u>003.01</u> The Executive Director will prepare an annual statement of all gifts, grants, bequests, royalties, and donations to the Funds for the prior fiscal year. The statement will indicate donor Fund designations, if any. The statement will include a report of any earnings on gifts, grants, bequests, royalties, donations or investments available for allocation by the Board.

<u>003.02</u> The Board may allocate each fiscal year an amount from the Endowment Fund to the Trust Fund for projects which conform to the funding categories of the Board to the extent that the Board determines those projects have merit. The amount of this allocation shall not include the principal of any grants previously made from the Trust Fund to the

Endowment Fund from proceeds originally credited to the Trust Fund pursuant to Nebraska Revised Statute § 9-812.

<u>003.03</u> The Board may award a grant each fiscal year from the Trust Fund to the Endowment Fund. The grant may not exceed two hundred percent (200%) of all other proceeds credited to the Endowment Fund in that year and may not exceed fifty percent (50%) of the total proceeds credited to the Trust Fund pursuant to Nebraska Revised Statute § 9-812 for that year. Grant awards allocated to the Endowment Fund from the Trust Fund shall remain invested in the Endowment Fund and shall not be reallocated.



CHAPTER 3 - APPLICATION PROCESS

<u>001.</u> FORM OF APPLICATION AND ACCOMPANYING MATERIALS. An applicant for financial assistance from the Trust shall comply with prevailing application method(s) approved by the Board no later than three (3) months prior to the submission deadline. The application shall be complete in every aspect at the time of submittal and may include additional information to demonstrate the project's eligibility for funding.

<u>001.01</u> The Executive Director shall review each application submitted and shall determine whether the application is substantially complete for initial review. The Executive Director shall review the eligibility criteria to provide an eligibility recommendation to the Grants Committee. The Grants Committee of the Board shall review each such application and shall make a preliminary recommendation of approval or rejection of the proposal for eligibility based on the recommendation of the Executive Director.

<u>001.02</u> For any application, the Grants Committee will determine whether further information will be needed to evaluate the eligibility of the proposal. If additional information is needed, the Executive Director will so notify the applicant, and provide a reasonable time period for submission of the additional material.

<u>002.</u> <u>TIMEFRAME FOR FILING AND REVIEW</u>. All applications shall be filed by the dates set by the Board as part of the adopted calendar for the application and review processes. All necessary reviews of each application shall also be completed in accordance with that calendar.

CHAPTER 4 - CRITERIA FOR ELIGIBILITY

<u>001.</u> <u>ELIGIBILITY REQUIREMENTS.</u> To be eligible for consideration in the rating processes for funding, the applicant's proposed project must be consistent with the following criteria for eligibility as described in Sections <u>001</u> to <u>006</u> of this Chapter.

001.01 PROHIBITION AGAINST FUNDING REGULATORY MANDATES.

- <u>001.01(A)</u> Regulatory means to control, direct, or govern.
- <u>001.01(B)</u> Regulations means only those rules codified in the Nebraska Administrative Code.
- <u>001.02</u> The fund shall not pay for projects to the extent such projects have direct beneficiaries who could afford the costs of the benefits without experiencing serious financial hardship. For purposes of this section, "direct beneficiaries" shall not be deemed to include a person who receives incidental benefits from a project which primarily benefits the general public. A serious financial hardship may be deemed to exist when the direct beneficiary of the grant funding, which may or may not be the grant sponsor or applicant, needs substantially all of its current and anticipated income and liquid assets to meet current and anticipated ordinary and necessary subsistence expenses during the project period.
- <u>001.03</u> The grants should assist those projects which will make a real contribution to achieving the board's environmental categories. A real contribution is one that is measurable.
- <u>001.04</u> The grants should assist those projects which offer the greatest public benefits; and the public benefit must be greater than an incidental private benefit.
- <u>001.05</u> Grants for land purchases or easements shall not cause the elimination of the property tax liability.
- <u>002.</u> <u>ENVIRONMENTAL ACCEPTANCE.</u> A project is considered to be environmentally acceptable when:
 - <u>002.01</u> The project will not jeopardize the continued existence of any threatened or endangered species or result in the destruction or modification of the critical habitat of any such species and shall meet the requirements contained in the Nongame and Endangered Species Conservation Act, Nebraska Revised Statute § 37-801; and
 - <u>002.02</u> The plan of development minimizes any adverse impacts on the natural environment, adequately addresses existing cultural resources and results in environmental net gain.
 - <u>002.03</u> In addition to any proposed mitigation measures, all aspects of the project which can be anticipated to result in environmental enhancement shall be considered in determining whether the plan minimizes adverse impacts. The Board may request

additional information it deems necessary in determining environmental acceptability. The applicant, if required by the Board, will be provided a reasonable period of time to respond to requests for information and such other items as the applicant of the Board identifies as relevant to the issued of environmental acceptance.

- <u>003. CLEAR AND DIRECT ENVIRONMENTAL BENEFITS</u>. A project will be considered to have clear and direct environmental benefits if the realization of those benefits can be reasonable expected, as a result of the project and if those benefits will be obvious. The application will need to describe the environmental benefits anticipated as a result of the project and how those benefits will be clearly and directly attained. Environmental benefit can be achieved through the contribution of assets and services that enhance the capability of communities and individuals to conserve, enhance, and restore the natural physical and biological environment in Nebraska, including the air, land, ground water and surface water, flora and fauna, prairies and forests, wildlife and wildlife habitat, and natural areas of aesthetic or scenic values.
- <u>004.</u> <u>CONTRIBUTION TO ACHIEVE THE BOARD'S FUNDING CATEGORIES.</u> Only those projects which contribute to the existing environmental categories established pursuant to the Nebraska Environmental Trust Act shall be eligible for financial assistance.
- <u>005.</u> <u>PUBLIC BENEFITS.</u> For a project to be eligible for funding assistance, it must produce public, not just private, benefits. The public benefit must be greater than the private benefit. The project must be implemented and completed in Nebraska. Public access is a public benefit.
- <u>006.</u> <u>FINANCIAL AND TECHNICAL FEASIBILITY.</u> Financial and technical feasibility may be evaluated by the use of subcommittees, contractual assistance or advisory groups. Standards for each of these factors are as set out below:
 - <u>006.01</u> <u>FINANCIAL FEASIBILITY.</u> A project is financially feasible if sufficient funds will be made available to complete the project as described in the application and to maintain and operate any tangible component of the project for its useful life or until disposal. Each applicant shall submit a project budget identifying the nature and amount of each source of funds to be used to carry out the project; a schedule indicating when such funds will be received; and a schedule indicating when the funds available will be expended to carry out the project. Additional financial data may be supplied by the applicant.
 - <u>006.02 TECHNICAL FEASIBILITY.</u> A project that is structural in nature shall be considered technically feasible when it can and will be designed, constructed, and operated utilizing accepted engineering and other technical principles and concepts to accomplish the purpose(s) for which it was planned. A project which is nonstructural in nature shall be considered to be technically feasible when it can and will be designed and carried out to accomplish the purpose(s) for which it was planned.

CHAPTER 5 - EVALUATING PROPOSALS FOR ELIGIBILITY

- <u>001. ELIGIBILITY REVIEW</u>. Upon receipt of all application material, the Executive Director shall submit the application to the Grants Committee of the Board appointed by the Chairperson and any technical advisory committee(s) established by the Board for final eligibility review. The Grants Committee and Advisory Committees members shall complete their reviews so that the application may be considered in accordance with the calendar established annually by the Board. The Grants Committee or any technical advisory committee member may request the Executive Director to obtain additional information from the applicant.
- <u>002.</u> <u>GRANTS COMMITTEE ACTION</u>. After receiving comments from any technical advisory committee reviewing an application, the Grants Committee shall make the following recommendations to the Board:
 - <u>002.01</u> Any conditions which the Grants Committee recommends be placed on the project to ensure its consistency with the objectives of the Trust Fund and with other state policies, plans, and programs.
- <u>003.</u> <u>REQUIRED FINDINGS</u>. Prior to making any recommendation to the Board for approval of a project for funding eligibility, the Grants Committee shall determine that the project is consistent with the requirements.
- <u>004.</u> <u>ELIGIBILITY FINDINGS COMBINED WITH RECOMMENDED RATINGS</u>. The Grants Committee shall make the recommendations to the Board on project eligibility in accordance with this chapter and at the same time provide the Board with a preliminary ranking list for all projects.
- <u>005.</u> <u>ACTION BY THE BOARD ON ELIGIBILITY RECOMMENDATIONS</u>. The Board may adopt or revise and adopt the recommendations of the Grants Committee. For each project for which eligibility is established by the Board, the Board shall also establish the total amount of money for which the project is eligible if it receives sufficient ranking for funding. Projects determined eligible for funding by the Board shall not be entitled to any funds until they have been subjected to the ranking processes and have received sufficient ranking for funding given the funds available.

Chapter 6 - PROJECT RANKING SYSTEMS

- <u>001.</u> Pursuant to this Chapter and the factors set forth herein, the Executive Director shall prepare Project Ranking Systems to be used to rank all applications which are eligible. The Project Ranking Systems shall be approved by an affirmative vote of the Board after public hearing. Similarly, any subsequent amendments to a Project Ranking System shall be approved by an affirmative vote of the Board after public hearing.
- <u>002.</u> The Project Ranking Systems adopted by the Board shall be used by the Grants Committee for ranking of projects.
- <u>003.</u> <u>RANKING FACTORS.</u> The Project Ranking Systems shall assign a numeric value to each criterion and combine these values into a total score for each application. Each Ranking System shall include, but is not limited to, criteria to evaluate each application to the extent that the project will accomplish the following:
 - 003.01 HELP THE BOARD ATTAIN A GEOGRAPHIC MIX OF PROJECTS OVER TIME. This does not mean that a strict geographic mix will be sought during each funding cycle but that points may be awarded to projects in specific areas if it becomes apparent that the area is receiving funding for proportionately fewer projects than other areas of the state.
 - <u>003.02</u> <u>BE COST EFFECTIVE.</u> Cost effective shall include, as applicable, a comparison of the cost of the project to its expected monetary and non-monetary benefits and whether there is another reasonably available means of accomplishing the same purpose or purposes more economically. A high indirect labor and overhead cost not directly related to the project direct costs is less cost effective than one with a low indirect rate or percentage. Data shall be provided by the applicant detailing the cost effectiveness of all budgeted expenses requested that includes the provided indirect rates.
 - <u>003.03</u> <u>HAVE ECONOMIC IMPACTS.</u> Economic impacts resulting from the project may be realized in increased real property valuations, mitigation of environmental hazards to the natural physical and biological environment in Nebraska, an improvement of or increase in habitat, increased recreational opportunities, and other contributions to the wellbeing of the area affected by the project. Data shall be provided by the applicant detailing the proposed economic impacts of the project.
 - <u>003.04 PRODUCE DIRECT ENVIRONMENTAL IMPACT</u>. Direct environmental impacts are those changes to the natural, physical, and biological environment caused by the project occurring at the time and in the place the project is carried out.
 - <u>003.05</u> <u>PRODUCE ENVIRONMENTAL BENEFITS TO THE GENERAL PUBLIC, ESPECIALLY BENEFITS WHICH ARE LONG TERM IN NATURE</u>. A long-term public benefit is defined as public benefits lasting in excess of ten (10) years. A project that is intended to extend beyond three (3) years in duration and can demonstrate that it can continue without NET Board support can be deemed a sustainable general public benefit. Projects less than three (3) years in duration must have a defined general public benefit listed in the application. Public access can be considered a general public benefit.

<u>O03.06</u> <u>PROVIDE A PLAN FOR EVALUATING THE RESULTS OF THE EXPENDITURE OF GRANT FUNDS.</u> An applicant shall provide a baseline measurement, the target improvement, and the real time value of the grant investment. The project goals, objectives and outcomes shall identify the tangible and intangible benefits to the public from achieving the objectives.

<u>003.07 EVALUATE PERFORMANCE</u>. For prior awarded grantees, awarded in the past three years looking back from the current application cycle, compliance with previous contract terms is required, including that any prior project was completed on time, quarterly, annual and final reports were submitted on time, no 15 Day Notice for a prior grant contract violation was issued to the grant Sponsor or Applicant.

<u>004.</u> Projects which are funded as multi-year projects may be exempted from the ranking process by the Board for the duration of the project or for up to the next two annual rankings following the ranking in which the initial commitment to the project is made provided that annual evaluations of progress toward project goals are submitted and accepted by the Executive Director. No commitment may exceed three years without formal action by the board to renew the grant or contract.

<u>005.</u> No application receiving fewer than twenty-five percent (25%) of the maximum points will be funded.

CHAPTER 7 - RANKING ELIGIBLE PROJECTS FOR FUNDING

- <u>001.</u> After the evaluation of applications for eligibility, all eligible projects shall be ranked according to the Project Ranking System established and adopted by the Board for the competition to which the application was submitted.
- <u>002.</u> Preliminary ranking shall be performed by the Grants Committee of the Board appointed by the Chairperson. In deciding the assignment of points for each eligible project, the Committee shall do so in a manner which provides a fair comparison of projects regardless of cost. More expensive projects shall not receive additional points just because they are larger in scale. Points shall be assigned with consideration of the anticipated effects of the project relative to its costs. The Committee may request assistance from the Executive Director to the extent necessary to evaluate each proposal.
- <u>003.</u> The Grants Committee may request additional information from any applicant in written form. All additional supplements shall be in writing and signed by the applicant.
- <u>004.</u> The Grants Committee shall report the results of the ranking process to the Chairperson by the date established therefore on the calendar approved annually by the Board. The report shall indicate the results of the ranking process with the highest scoring project at the top of the list along with the number of points scored and the amount of funding recommended to be approved. Lower ranked projects shall follow in sequential order showing the same information for each.
- <u>005.</u> Upon receipt of the Grants Committee report, the Chairperson shall call a meeting of the Board to adopt or revise and adopt the Committee report and schedule a public hearing on the proposed funding list.
- <u>006.</u> After the public hearing is conducted on the proposed funding list, the Board may take action on actual funding. If the Board decides that any proposed project does not have sufficient merit to justify funding from the Trust, the Board may choose not to fund the project notwithstanding its consistency with eligibility criteria or its final ranking. The proposed list may be revised after the public hearing only with the approval of a majority of Board members present.
- <u>007.</u> Notwithstanding ratings determined in this Chapter, no allocation of funds shall be made for remediation in a manner inconsistent with Nebraska Revised Statute § 81-15,176(2)(b).

CHAPTER 8 - GRANT ADMINISTRATION

- <u>001.</u> After the Board takes action to award grants to specific projects, the Executive Director shall begin notification procedures. The Executive Director shall also prepare grant documents for disbursement in accordance with this Chapter.
 - <u>001.01</u> Grant documents shall include a notice of grant award, a disbursement schedule, standard conditions and any special conditions all of which will be included in a grant contract to be signed by the grantee.
- <u>002.</u> The Executive Director shall prepare standard conditions applicable to all grants and shall have discretion to negotiate specific conditions within the limits of the intent specified by the Board.
- <u>003.</u> Grant award contracts which bind the Trust Fund shall be signed by the Chairperson and the Executive Director.
- <u>004.</u> The grant period shall be a set period of time designated in the grant documents based upon activities approved for grant funding. All grant funds shall be expended in accordance with conditions of the grant. Any unexpended funds remaining after the grant period shall be returned by the grantee to the Fund.
 - <u>004.01</u> All interest earned by grant funds shall be considered a part of the grant and, therefore, is subject to all of the requirements of the grant.
- <u>005.</u> Any grant contract which includes the transfer or acquisition of real property which is taxable before such transfer or acquisition shall specify a mechanism to address the continued payment of property taxes or payments in lieu of property taxes.
- <u>006.</u> Any grant contract which includes a construction project may require, but not be limited to, the following special conditions:
 - <u>006.01</u> Final plans and specifications shall be approved by the Executive Director. The Executive Director may require that plans and specifications be stamped by a Professional Engineer registered to practice in the State of Nebraska.
 - <u>006.02</u> A construction schedule including commencement of construction; accountability for inspection during construction; construction completion; and initiation of operation (if applicable).

- <u>006.03</u> The Executive Director may provide a contingency within the grant for change orders.
 - <u>006.03(A)</u> All change orders must be approved by the Executive Director in a manner set out within the grant contract.
- <u>006.04</u> Upon completion of the project, a certification of completion shall be filed with the Board, which certifies that construction was substantially consistent with the approved plans and specifications. The certification shall be signed by the grantee. The Executive Director may also require a certification signed by a Professional Engineer registered to practice in the State of Nebraska.
- <u>007.</u> The applicant shall assure the Executive Director that all legal requirements have or can be met prior to the allocation of funds. Legal information may include the following as appropriate for the project, this list is not exclusive to other necessary information:
 - <u>007.01</u> If the applicant is a governmental entity, citation(s) to the legal authorities relied upon by the applicant to undertake or participate in the project.
 - <u>007.02</u> An explanation, with appropriate documentation of legal authorities, of the applicant's intention to finance that part of the project for which assistance from the fund is not requested.
 - <u>007.03</u> A showing that the applicant has or can acquire any necessary land rights or water rights.
 - <u>007.04</u> Copies of any available proposed or executed contracts or bids for construction or consultant services necessary for completion of the project which would help document the project's estimated costs.
 - <u>007.05</u> A listing of any permits, licenses, or other approvals required for the project, their current status, and the estimated schedule for compliance.
 - <u>007.06</u> An explanation of the applicant's plan to require consultants, contractors, and subcontractors to obtain liability insurance or bonding to ensure the proper design and construction of the project, as applicable.
 - <u>007.07</u> An analysis of the applicant's potential liability for damages because of the project including failure of structural measures and an explanation of the applicant's plan to protect itself from any such liability.
 - <u>007.08</u> Such other information, plans, and specifications as requested by the Executive Director or the Board and are reasonably necessary to confirm the applicant's authority.
- <u>008.</u> Funds shall be disbursed to the grantee no more often than once per month in accordance with the grant contract.

- <u>009.</u> The grantee shall keep financial records for the project and shall submit periodic progress reports as required to the Executive Director during the grant period. At the end of the grant period, the grantee shall submit a final financial report summarizing the project. If a survivability clause was in the grant award contract, a separate legal instrument for those items identified in the grant contract may be required to close out the grant contract. Failure to submit the progress reports may be considered a violation of the grant contract. The progress report shall include, but not be limited to:
 - <u>009.01</u> A comprehensive expenditure report of all grant funds, including any interest earned on grant funding by line item, and all other income utilized to carry out the project.
 - <u>009.02</u> Copies of all receipts for expenditures of grant funding and expenditures of all interest earned on grant funding.
 - <u>009.03</u> An inventory of all equipment or personal property purchased with grant funding including model number and serial number; and
 - 009.04 Any additional information required.
- <u>010.</u> If a grantee wishes to modify a project other than one covered by Section <u>006</u> above, the grantee must submit a proposed amendment to the grant contract including a revised line-item budget. The proposed amendment must be submitted to the Executive Director at least thirty (30) days prior to the requested changes with an explanation of need. The Executive Director will then either approve or deny the proposal and inform the grantee in writing of his or her decision. The request will require Nebraska Environmental Trust Board approval if over \$10,000.
 - <u>010.01</u> Any expenditure of grant funds not in accordance with the grant contract and not pursuant to the process set out in Section <u>008</u> may be considered a violation of the grant requirement.
- <u>011.</u> Equipment and other personal property purchased with grant funding shall be used only for purposes of the grant during the term of the grant contract.
- <u>012.</u> Failure by the grantee to comply with these regulations or with the grant contract may result in a revocation of the grant, a withholding of grant disbursements or a requirement to reimburse the fund for money already disbursed under the contract.
 - <u>012.01</u> Prior to any action under Section <u>012</u> by the Executive Director, there shall be a written notice to the grantee explaining the intended action and the reason it may be taken. The grantee shall have fifteen (15) days to respond to the notice and may request an informal meeting with the Executive Director within that time frame. After fifteen (15) days have expired, the Executive Director may proceed with his or her action under Section 012.
- <u>013.</u> In addition to financial progress reports as required in Section <u>009</u>, grantees shall submit annual reports to the Board. The Board shall conduct annual reviews of existing projects for compliance with the project goals and grant requirements through reports provided by grantees and staff. Annual reports shall be due as specified in the grant contract.

<u>014.</u> The Executive Director shall conduct periodic financial audits of projects at a frequency as determined by the Executive Director. Audits shall be performed to ensure proper use of grant funds and to determine compliance with these regulations and with the grant contract.

<u>014.01</u> Grantees shall retain all records related to a project and shall allow access to the records by the Executive Director or his or her designee during regular business hours or at any reasonable hour of the day.

<u>014.02</u> The grantee shall allow access for inspection of any equipment, property, or other tangible object for which grant funds were expended to the Executive Director or his or her designee.



CHAPTER 9 – DEFINITIONS

- <u>001.</u> <u>CALENDAR</u> shall mean the calendar established each year by the Board to set out various deadline dates relating to establishment of funding categories, receipt and review of grant applications, and allocation of grants.
- <u>002.</u> <u>APPLICANT</u> shall mean any person, or their authorized agent, who submits and signs an application for grant allocations.
- <u>003.</u> <u>EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR</u> shall mean the Executive Director of the Nebraska Environmental Trust.
- <u>004.</u> <u>PRIMARY, TANGIBLE BENEFITS</u> shall mean a project's net values, expressed in monetary terms, of increases in products and services and of reductions in costs, damages, or losses of primary beneficiaries.
- <u>005.</u> <u>BOARD</u> shall mean the Nebraska Environmental Trust Board.
- 006. TRUST FUND shall mean the Nebraska Environmental Trust Fund.
- <u>007.</u> <u>ENDOWMENT FUND</u> shall mean the Nebraska Environmental Endowment Fund.
- <u>008.</u> <u>FUNDS</u> shall mean both the Nebraska Environmental Trust and the Nebraska Environmental Endowment.

RE: Title 137 Revisions

Dear Mark Quandahl and members of the Nebraska Environmental Trust Board,

On behalf of the 12,000 members in Audubon Nebraska, a state office of the National Audubon Society, we are providing comments regarding proposed changes to Title 137 and request this be included as a part of the public hearing record.

Under the Criteria for Eligibility – 005. PUBLIC BENEFITS. The public benefit must be greater than the private benefit. The project must be implemented and completed in Nebraska. Public access is a public benefit.

Consider the ramifications of adding <u>only</u> public access as a public benefit. By defining only one public benefit, you limit the scope of applications. To achieve the public benefits and goals as stated in Statute of wildlife, clean air and water among other goals, projects must occur on private land given Nebraska is approximately 97% privately owned. Just a few other examples to consider of public benefits beyond access include that wetland restoration recharges aquifers and improves drinking water quality and quantity, and that providing habitat for at-risk and declining species prevents expensive threatened and endangered species listings and avoids government red tape for businesses.

There is a missed opportunity to engage your stakeholders and partners in establishing and refining funding categories on a regularly occurring basis to achieve your mission,

"The Trust is to lead in the development of a vision of Nebraska's future environment.

The Trust is to collaborate with public and private efforts to achieve that vision."

It is appropriate in regulations to elaborate on the public involvement process mentioned in statute to achieve the mission of the Trust that seeks collaboration with public and private entities actively engaged in the work.

We are opposed to the deletion of - 004 The Board Shall Not: Undertake conservation projects under the funding categories for expenditure of the Funds as a sole sponsor.

Other states with similar programs that did not explicitly prohibit the administering entity or board members from receiving funding have created competition, diminished partnerships and implementation.

Audubon protects birds and the places they need, today and tomorrow. The National Audubon Society is a conservation organization focused on birds and their conservation and seeks to bring awareness to the condition of our environment and how changes impact birds, natural resources, our economy, and communities.



003.106 PROVIDE A PLAN FOR EVALUATING THE RESULTS OF THE EXPENDITURE OF GRANT FUNDS. An applicant shall provide a baseline measurement, the target improvement, and the real time value of the grant investment. The project goals, objectives and outcomes shall identify the tangible and intangible benefits to the public from achieving the objectives.

Requiring increased monitoring and evaluation will reduce the overall impact. Providing evidence of a completed project is appropriate but requiring baseline measurements and real time value (which is vague) will mean many projects will take an additional field season to establish a baseline and will likely require hiring consultants or outside expertise to provide baseline and real time value information. This will eliminate smaller organizations and individuals from applying. Large organizations with grant administrators, multiple areas of expertise, and the ability to hire consultants will have an advantage. Smaller, Nebraska non-profits and landowner organizations will be at a disadvantage. If this change is necessary, then multi-year grants need to be encouraged and hiring consultants and researchers should also be encouraged and expected.

Ducks Unlimited (DU) welcomes the opportunity to attend and provide comments on the proposed changes to Title 137 rules and regulations governing the Nebraska Environmental Trust (NET). Since its inception, DU has partnered with the Trust on many important projects to enhance water quality and wildlife habitat throughout Nebraska. We look forward to continuing that positive relationship, and offer these comments in the spirit of constructive collaboration.

DU understands the interest in avoiding duplication between the rules and existing statutes, and many of the proposed rule changes accomplish that purpose. However, we also have questions and/or concerns about some of the provisions.

CHAPTER 1 SCOPE OF ACTIVITIES

Many of these changes address overlap with existing statute, but the motivation for eliminating Section 004, prohibiting the Board from owning land or sponsoring conservation projects, is unclear. The need for the proposed change to Section 005 on Agency Director Abstentions from a total prohibition to only those involving over 50% of the grant award is also unclear.

CHAPTER 2 FUNDING CATEGORIES

Again, many of these changes eliminate duplication with existing statute. However, the proposal to delete Section 004, Refinements and Clarifications in Five Year Funding Categories, could negatively impact grantees. Currently, any refinements or clarifications cannot retroactively affect the eligibility of a project. Removing this provision could allow changes to the funding categories during a grant cycle, when applicants have relied on existing categories.

CHAPTER 5(4) CRITERIA FOR ELIGIBILITY

The overarching theme of the proposed changes in this section, and the Project Ranking Systems

(more below) appears to be additional quantification of both environmental and economic benefits. This is a significant departure from the NET's history, and one that could be both very subjective, and burdensome on smaller entities without technical staff to conduct that analysis. These changes also indicate a skepticism toward private lands conservation, and concern about the public benefit of such projects. Because Nebraska is 97% privately owned, private lands conservation has been the backbone of wildlife habitat, water quality and quantity, soil health, and outdoor recreation, including hunting, for generations. While we applaud the recognition of public access as a public benefit, moving away from private lands conservation would be unfortunate for Nebraska's environment and natural resources, which is the purpose of the Trust. Specifically, the following proposed changes are notable:

<u>Section 001.06(02)</u> – The proposed definition of a "serious financial hardship" is unclear it appears that private lands conservation will only be allowable in extreme financial circumstances. It is also unclear what level of personal/financial information may be required of landowners involved in conservation projects.

<u>Section 001.11(05)</u> – Grants for land purchases or easements shall not cause the elimination of the property tax liability. Conservation easements specifically keep land in private ownership and on the tax rolls. Governmental entities and nonprofit organizations, including Ducks Unlimited, make payments in lieu of taxes to accommodate this issue.

<u>Section 003</u> – Clear and Direct Environmental Benefits. Requiring specific quantification of direct environmental benefits is a major change to the granting process, and one that could be very burdensome for smaller entities without such technical capacity.

<u>Section 005</u> – Public Benefits. Identifying public access as a public benefit is a positive, but it is unclear how public and private benefits will be compared to determine which is greater.

CHAPTER 6(5) EVALUATING PROPOSALS FOR ELIGIBILITY

<u>Section 002</u> – Grants Committee Action. The elimination of two subsections appears to alleviate the board from making approval or rejection recommendations (which may be implied), or from recommending assistance for eligible projects.

CHAPTER 7(6) PROJECT RANKING SYSTEMS

Changes to this chapter are significant, and a major shift to the existing ranking system. In particular, removing four ranking factors in Subsection 003 is concerning. The funding categories have provided a critical framework for project funding—eliminating this as a ranking factor creates ambiguity and could open the floodgates to non-germane grant applications. Matching funds, including in-kind match, and public private partnerships have played an important role in leveraging the Trust's resources over the years. These resources are also advantageous for smaller entities with fewer resources. This is critical for an efficient use of public funds, and are typical of many public grant programs. In addition to these overall comments, the following specific changes warrant additional discussion:

<u>Section 003.06(02)</u> – Be Cost Effective. Cost effectiveness is critical for public grant programs, and could be addressed through the ranking factors that are being eliminated above. While there is a legitimate concern for overhead, administrative or other non-project costs, certain staffing is required to deliver conservation projects.

<u>Section 003.07(03)</u> – Have Economic Impacts. This is a new requirement for grant ranking, one that may be hard to quantify, particularly for smaller organizations.

<u>Section 003.10(06)</u> – It is unclear what is meant by "real time value of the grant investment[.]"

<u>Section 003.11(07)</u> – Evaluate Performance. Scrutiny of prior grant compliance is certainly justified, but this requirement should include an acknowledgement of the difficulties of working in natural conditions and differentiate an occasional, small noncompliant act as opposed to chronic incidents. Conservation work is outdoors, subject to weather and other delays. In addition, the occasional form may be late due to unforeseen circumstances such as an annual report submission being delayed because of illness. Hopefully uncontrollable site conditions and isolated incidents would not negatively impact subsequent grant applications.

Thank you for your attention to these matters, we look forward to the hearing on May 4.

Comments and Testimony to Revisions of Title 137 Proposed by the Board of the Nebraska Environmental Trust

The current version of Title 137 needs revision. However, the Board's proposed revision is legally deficient, misleading, ambiguous, and will unnecessarily discourage potential applicants. If the revision is adopted applicants will find it advisable to hire consultants and lawyers and, even then, be uncertain whether their application meets proposed standards. And applicants not be confident based on the proposed rules and regulations that an application will receive an evaluation that is transparent and fair.

DRAFTING ADVICE

Earlier in the Board's Title 137 revision process the Friends of the Nebraska Environment Trust offered drafting advice. We believe the advice is still good and provides a basis for general comments concerning the draft revision of Title 137 submitted for hearing.

- 1. Rules and regs can supply definitions for terms that are undefined in statute but important for understanding or carrying out the statute. Examples are:
 - Economic feasibility
 - Financial feasibility
 - Technical feasibility
 - Those terms are in 81-15,175(1) and describe determinations that can be made by consultants. Financial feasibility and technical feasibility are defined in the existing regs; economic feasibility is not.
- 2. Quote statutes to provide an easy reference for persons interested in the purpose, authority, and limitations pertinent to the agency. It is important to quote statutes exactly and to reference the quote. There are instances in the current regs where quotes are inexact and there are no references to the source.
- 3. If the language of a statute is open to interpretation, provide an interpretation that is in keeping with the intent and spirit of the legislative framework for the activity being affected.
- 4. For selected activities provide a clear path so the phases of that activity will allow the user to go from the beginning to the end without going back and forth to find relevant or essential guidance.
- 5. Be informative rather than bewildering. A conscious effort must be made to avoid bureaucratic language. An author who has worked for years with a subject may be writing for themselves when the real audience is not an expert or may not be well informed.
- 6. Writing a rule or reg to resolve a single issue should be avoided. The rules and regs should provide parameters for using discretion to resolve a variety of issues.
- 7. If discretion is allowed, describing how the use of that discretion will be managed is necessary. Parameters for the exercise of discretion are: who will make a decision, factors pertinent to the decision, rationale for the decision, and how notice of the results will be given to an affected person. All are necessary elements to be described in rules and regs.
- 8. The rules and regs cannot exceed statutory authority so keep the statutes at hand as you work.

GENERAL COMMENTS

In its description of the background for the proposed changes to Title 137 the Board advises "When a regulation restated a state statute, it was removed from Title 137 as the state statute is sufficient." That standard has been applied inconsistently in the Board's revision. The proposed revision of Chapter 1 is an example. Much of the revision is a deletion of references to statute or recitation of statutory provisions. Including them after revision to conform with statutory language and providing citations could be helpful to the public who otherwise would need to access the statutes when seeking information about the Board. One exception to the deletion of statutory provisions is the retention of a regulation that concerns Board members who are agency directors. Agency directors are the most sophisticated and knowledgeable members of the board and have others to advise them. Do they need help that is denied the public?

The retained language Chapter 1 illustrates two other issues. The relevant statute is not set out in the regulation. Had the statute been set out it would be apparent that a definition of the word "primarily" is needed. Primarily means, by various court decision, more than 50% so it's an easy definition. It is important to supplement statutes in rules and regulations when a word requires definition, when a statute is vague, or cannot be implemented without standards or processes.

The language of the existing rule sets out a standard that is not supported by the relevant statute. There is no support for the language declaring that the standard for determining whether an agency primarily benefits is "the value of grant award accrues to the agency as primary, tangible benefits." The language of the relevant statute is clear the standard is "funding primarily to his or her agency." The definition of "primary tangible benefits in Chap 9 004 does not cure the problem.

Quoting and citing a relevant statute is advisable to avoid issues presented and to be an easy reference to the public. Less than careful adherence to statutory language will be observed in other provisions of the proposed revisions to Title 137, some of them old and some of them new.

The Chap 1 proposal of the Board shows that it wants to guide select members but does not choose to guide applicants or the general public. That attitude can be read in other provisions of the draft. Statutory ambiguities that affect applicants are not resolved and guidance is not given or revoked. Constraints affecting applicants that are unnecessary or unwise are proposed while maximum discretion is sought for the Board.

Our analysis of various provisions of the proposed revision follows.

REQUIRED RULE OR REGULATION NOT PROVIDED

Relevant Statute

Any person may petition an agency requesting the adoption of a rule or regulation. Each agency shall prescribe by rule or regulation the form of the petition and the procedure for its submission, consideration, and disposition. Within sixty days after submission of a petition, the agency shall

(1) deny the petition in writing, stating its reasons therefor, (2) initiate rulemaking or regulation making proceedings in accordance with the Administrative Procedure Act, or (3) if otherwise lawful, adopt a rule or regulation. 84-907.08

Comment

The cited statute has been in effect since 1994. Neither Title 137 nor the proposed revision complies with the requirements of the statute.

FAILS TO CARRY OUT LEGISLATIVE INTENT

Three proposals in Chap 6, 003.02, 003.03 and 003.6 add requirements which singly and together will make writing grant application a professional's task. Legislative intent as found in testimony of those who created the Nebraska Environmental Trust was for a grant process that ordinary citizens could use. Randy Wood then Director of the Department of Environmental Control testifying on behalf of the Governor in support of legislation creating the Nebraska Environmental Trust expressed the intent of the legislation "I think the most attractive and the biggest benefit of the Environmental Trust is that it enables the citizens, it enables the citizens today and the citizens tomorrow to do something to...for the quality of life and for the environment for the future. We all know that those citizens out there have a vision. They have a great deal of creativity. They have a great deal of ability to network with private and public entities out there to get a job done. Government doesn't do that very well. We don't look to the future very well. We've got our head down. We' re trying to solve problems today. You' re faced every year with us coming to you and say we've got all of these major problems, we need more money to do what we have to do today. We very seldom have an opportunity to look to the future and say, here are some things that need to be done. We need to do some of those things for the future. This bill will enable the average citizen, will enable those average citizen groups out there to come to the trust board with a brilliant idea, an idea that does something lasting, it does something substantial in terms of quality of life and environment in the future, come to the trust, get some money, leverage that money out there in the private world and so something real." Transcript of Testimony before the Revenue Committee on January 23, 1992, by Randy Wood, Director of the Department of Environmental Control, on behalf of Governor Nelson in support of LB 1026. The language of LB 1026 creating the Nebraska Environment Trust was amended into LB 1257 1992 for passage.

It is hard to imagine an average citizen who could prepare an application and meet the strictures of the three proposed regulations noted above or found in Title 137 generally as proposed by the Board. Even if they understood the language or found critical statutory requirements that are not acknowledged or discussed they would struggle to submit a viable application without costly consultants to provide data and analysis.

CHAPTER 1

Board's Proposal

0051. CONFLICT OF INTEREST. Members of the board shall comply with the conflict of interest

provisions of the Nebraska Political Accountability and Disclosure Act.

0501.01 AGENCY DIRECTOR ABSTENTIONS. In addition, any Any board member who is also a director of a state agency shall abstain from voting on applications where more than 50% of the value of grant award accrues to the agency as primary, tangible benefits. Grant funds administered by the agency and passed through to other grant recipients are not considered to accrue value to the agency.

Relevant Statute

49-1499.06. Nebraska Environmental Trust Board; abstention; when. Any member of the Nebraska Environmental Trust Board who is also a director of a state agency shall abstain from voting on applications pursuant to the Nebraska Environmental Trust Act which would provide funding primarily to his or her agency.

Comment

When a statute is used as the basis for a regulation it is our recommendation that the language of the statute be quoted exactly. If the statutory language requires amplification or interpretation the necessary language should be separate. For example, court decisions interpret the word primarily as being more than 50%. Language in a regulation reflecting that determination would be valid and helpful. There is no support for the language declaring that the standard is "the value of grant award accrues to the agency as primary, tangible benefits." The language of the statute is clear the standard is "funding primarily to his or her agency."

A definition of "primary, tangible benefits is provided in Chap 9 004. The offered definition does not solve the problem and adds uncertainty. The definition speaks of net project values expressed in monetary terms. If that is to be a proxy for "funding" it fails both because it is difficult to determine and because "funding" is a clear term easy to determine while net project values is indefinite and difficult to determine.

CHAPTER 2

Board's Proposal

002. RECEIPT OF GIFTS, GRANTS, BEQUESTS, ROYALTIES AND DONATIONS.
002.01 The Board may accept any gift, grant, bequest, royalty, or donation specifically designated for restricted purposes or projects which fall within the scope and purpose of the Nebraska Environmental Trust Act as defined in Chapter 1 and funding categories as defined in Chapter 2, except that the Board will not accept title to or legal interest in real property. The Board may establish a dollar value below which it will not accept specifically designated gifts. The Board may refuse any gift, grant, quest, royalty, or donation at its sole discretion. The Board shall seek approval by the Governor of any gift or bequest of personal property in

excess of \$10,000.00.

Relevant Legislation

The last sentence is a reference to language that has been included in budget bills for many years requiring gubernatorial approval of some gifts. It has never been adopted as substantive law and codified. The full text of the gifting provision in the 2023 budget bill is set out below.

LB 814 2023 Sec. 273. GIFTS, BEQUESTS, AND DEVISES.

Any gift, bequest, or devise made available to the State of Nebraska for any purpose or purposes, together with the income thereof, shall be allocated to the expending agency designated by such donor or, if none is designated by such donor, by the Governor.

Acceptance of a gift, bequest, or devise shall be subject to approval by the expending agency and the following restrictions:

- (1) No matching of state funds shall be required as a condition of acceptance;
- (2) Any gift or bequest of personal property in excess of \$10,000 shall be approved by the Governor before acceptance;
- (3) Any gift or devise of real property in excess of \$10,000 shall be approved by the Governor and the Legislature before acceptance pursuant to sections 81-176 and 81-1108.33; and
- (4) Sections 81-176 and 81-1108.33 shall govern the acquisition of real property and structures with the proceeds of a gift, bequest, or devise. For purposes of this section, gifts, bequests, and devises shall include, but not be limited to, donations, gifts, beguests, devises, and grants from individuals, organizations, corporations, and similar entities and from nonfederal governmental agencies. At the discretion of the budget administrator of the budget division of the Department of Administrative Services and the Accounting Administrator of the Department of Administrative Services, expenditures of funds from any gift, bequest, or devise may be expended through any existing or administratively created cash fund account, revolving fund account, or trust fund account, in which case the actual amount of the gift, bequest, or devise is hereby appropriated to the expending agency, for the purpose or purposes designated by the donor, in addition to the amounts appropriated in this act. If no such cash fund account, revolving fund account, or trust fund account exists, the Accounting Administrator may create such fund account as is necessary to properly and separately account for the gift, beguest, or devise, in which case the actual amount of the gift, bequest, or devise is hereby appropriated to the expending agency, for the purpose or purposes designated by the donor, in addition to the amounts appropriated in this act.

Comment

The issue is more complicated than the proposed language indicates. If the provision is to be made applicable there are other requirements that should be described if the purpose of the regulation to assist compliance.

It is doubtful that the budgetary language applies to the Trust. The board has the power to "Apply for or accept any gift, grant, bequest, royalty, or donation, designate the fund to which it will be credited, and expend the proceeds in furtherance of the purposes of the trust." 81-15,173 (11) Under well- recognized rules of statutory construction the cited statutory provision that applies particularly and explicitly to NET controls rather than general language in the budget resolution.

CHAPTER 3

Board's Proposal

001. <u>FORM OF APPLICATION AND ACCOMPANYING MATERIALS</u>. An applicant for financial assistance from the Trust shall comply with prevailing application method(s) approved by the

Board no later than three (3) months prior to the submission deadline. The application **shall be complete in every aspect at the time of submittal** and may include additional information to demonstrate the project's eligibility for funding. according to criteria defined in Chapter 5 and to demonstrate the project's consistency with the annual rating factors as defined in Chapter 7.

001.01 The Executive Director shall review each application submitted and shall determine whether the application is <u>substantially</u> complete for initial review. <u>The Executive Director shall review the eligibility criteria to provide an eligibility recommendation to the Grants Committee.</u> The Grants Committee of the Board shall review each such application and shall make a preliminary recommendation of approval or rejection of the proposal for eligibility <u>based on the recommendation of the Executive Director.</u>

Comment

One provision requires the application of be **complete** in **every respect** another requires it to be <u>substantially</u> complete. The two standards are incompatible.

Chap 3 001 requires the Grants Committee to make a preliminary recommendation "based on the recommendation of the Executive Director." If the Grants Committee can only consider the recommendation of the Executive director it cannot consider the grant application itself or any additional information it might request and receive pursuant to the following provision of the following proposed rule.

Board's Proposal

001.02 For any application, the Grants Committee will determine whether further information will be needed to evaluate the eligibility of the proposal. If additional information is needed, the Executive Director will so notify the applicant, and provide a reasonable time period for submission of the additional material.

Comment

The proposal allows the "Grants Committee" to request information. Can information be requested by an individual member of the Committee? Requiring Committee actions seems cumbersome.

The Executive Director should be able ask for additional information to make his or her recommendation. If the Executive Director has questions and obtains information it will improve the recommendation and may reduce the need for the Committee or its members to make requests for information.

Chapter 4

NOTE The Chapter 4 proposal is exceptionally difficult to analyze. Statutes are not cited as source material, grants prohibited by 81-15,176 are described in terms of application eligibility or rather non eligibility although that is not clear, and new language in at least one instance is not understood by the review. In addition, not all prohibited grants are described in the proposed chapter leaving an uninformed reader without guidance in the Title leaving them to rely on a review of statutes which they may not know is necessary.

Board's Proposal

001. <u>ELIGIBILITY REQUIREMENTS</u>. To be eligible for consideration in the rating processes for funding, the applicant's proposed project must be consistent with the following criteria for eligibility as described in Sections 00<u>21</u> to 006 of this Chapter.

001.01 PROHIBITION AGAINST FUNDING REGULATORY MANDATES.

001.01(A) Regulatory means to control, direct, or govern.

001.01(B) Regulations refers only to those rules codified in the Nebraska Administrative Code.

001.02 The grants shall not be used to implement actions mandated by regulations except remediation.

Relevant Statute

"The grants shall not provide direct assistance to regulatory programs or to implement actions mandated by regulations except remediation;" 81-15,176 (2) (a)

Comment

New Chap 4 001.01 makes no sense without reference to the stricken provision which is an imperfect expression of the statutory language. The statutory language should be stated, cited, and interpreted as necessary for an understanding of its provisions. In various other proposed rules, the caption allows integration of the section into the whole but that is not the result with 1.01 it is a statement in search of a purpose.

Confining the scope of the statutory provisions to Nebraska regulations is doubtful. Federal regulations are regulations.

A definition of rule and regulation is contained in 84-901 (2), a part of the Administrative Procedures Act.

"Rule or regulation shall mean any standard of general application adopted by an agency in accordance with the authority conferred by statute and includes, but is not limited to, the amendment or repeal of a rule or regulation. Rule or regulation shall not include (a) internal procedural documents which provide guidance to staff on agency organization and operations, lacking the force of law, and not relied upon to bind the public, (b) guidance documents as issued by an agency in accordance with section 84-901.03, and (c) forms and instructions developed by an agency. For purposes of the act, every standard which prescribes a penalty shall be presumed to have general applicability and any standard affecting private rights, private interests, or procedures available to the public is presumed to be relied upon to bind the public. Nothing in this section shall be interpreted to require an agency to adopt and promulgate rules and regulations when statute authorizes but does not require it;"

The definition of rule and regulation cited should be consulted.

The failure to note in the regulation that remediation is excepted from the proscription is misleading. If the proposed regulation is an attempt to abrogate the statute it is void.

Board's Proposal

001.062 The fund shall not pay for projects to the extent such projects have direct beneficiaries who could afford the costs of the benefits without experiencing serious financial hardship

For purposes of this section, "direct beneficiaries" shall not be deemed to include a person or entity who receives incidental benefits from a project which primarily benefits the general public. A serious financial hardship may be deemed to exist when the direct beneficiary of the grant funding, which may or may not be the grant sponsor or applicant, needs substantially all of its current and anticipated income and liquid assets to meet current and anticipated ordinary and necessary subsistence expenses during the project period.

Relevant Statute

The grants shall not pay for projects which have direct beneficiaries who could afford the costs of the benefits without experiencing serious financial hardship; 81-15,176 (2) (d)

Comment

The statutory language should be used and the source cited

A better drafting technique is to define "person" to include a wide variety of entities. That is the approach taken in 30-2209 (32) "Person means an individual, a corporation, an organization, a limited liability company, or other legal entity." In addition, the word entity requires definition. "Entity includes domestic and foreign business corporation; domestic and foreign nonprofit corporation; limited liability company; estate; trust; domestic and foreign unincorporated entity; and state, United States, and foreign government." 21-214 (17). Another definition found in Nebraska Statutes. "Entity means an association, a business trust, a company, a corporation, a cooperative, a limited cooperative association, a general partnership, a limited liability company, a limited liability partnership, or a limited partnership, domestic or foreign." 21-2903(8). There may be more the two. The definitions cited is the result of a partial search.

Using that approach avoids the use of the word "its" in the new language to identify a person.

If statutory language is to be explained or interpreted it is better practice to quote the language of the statute without change and then explain or interpret the language. The new language applies to a direct beneficiary but leaves open the question "Who is a direct beneficiary?" There is a recognition that a direct beneficiary may not be the grant sponsor or applicant. If the direct beneficiary is the general public the standard could not be applied. If the direct beneficiary is the grant applicant or sponsor the provision may not have application to an entity as it is limited to "subsistence expenses." Usually, subsistence is thought to be the minimum necessary to sustain a living organism. If that word is to have a broader definition that should be described. Beyond that concern, if the provision is applied to an entity and its budget is balanced but does not include the project then the grant funding would be allowed. The proposed language with that interpretation is meaningless.

NOTE An attorney with over 40 years of experience related to budgets and fiscal practices of State and local government and private business advised that he could not prepare an application with confidence that the requirements of the proposal of the proposed rule could be met.

Comment

NOTE Section 81-15,176 contains sections which prohibit the granting of an appliction that are not included in the proposed reg.

81-15,176 (2) (b) No more than sixty percent of grant allocations in any year shall assist remediation of soils or ground water, and no grants for this purpose shall occur unless all other available sources of funding are, in the opinion of the board, being substantially utilized;

81-15,176 (2) (c) The grants shall not pay for projects which provide primarily private benefits or relieve private liability for environmental damage; See Chap 4 005

81-15,176 (2) (i) The grants shall not pay for land or easements acquired without the full and express consent of the landowner.

Because those statutory provisions prohibit the issuance of grants, an applicant who did not read the statute and believed the reg contained all of the guidance needed could submit a ineligible application for a grant. That is a waste of time and effort and easily countered by including the statutory provisions and amplifying as necessary. When some of the five mandatory provisions in 81-15,176 (2) are quoted and supplemented, the rationale for leaving the others out is not apparent.

Proposed regulation Chapter 6 005 may be intended to address the provisions of 81-15,176 (2)(c) if so, the statute should be copied and cited in connection with that proposal.

Board's Proposal

001.093 The grants should assist those projects which will make a real contribution to achieving the board's environmental categories. A real contribution is one that is measurable.

Relevant Statute

The grants should assist those projects which will make a real contribution to achieving the board's environmental categories; 81-15,176 (2) (g)

Comment

A portion of the proposed rule is the text of a statute. The statute should be identified with a cite.

The new language creates uncertainty. A real contribution is not defined. We suggest the following.

A real contribution is a contribution that positively affects the natural physical or biological environment in Nebraska including the air, land, ground water and surface water, flora and fauna, prairies and forests, wildlife and wildlife habitat, and areas of aesthetic or scientific values in a way that is consistent with the environmental goals of the Trust.

The requirement that the "real contribution" be measurable like the requirements for data in other proposed regulations may not be possible to achieve with credibility. It causes the engagement of consultants or advisors skilled at speculation and billing.

Board's Proposal

001.404 The grants should assist those projects which offer the greatest public benefits; and the public benefit must be greater than an incidental private benefit.

Relevant Statute

The grants should assist those projects which offer the greatest public benefits; 81-14-5,176 (2) (h)

Comment

A portion of the proposed rule is the text of a statute. The statute should be identified with a cite.

The added language appears to require that private benefits be incidental when compared to public benefits. It would be useful to describe what a public benefit is and what a private benefit is.

Section 005 of Chapter 4 requires a public benefit. New language for that provision requires that the public benefit be "greater" than the private benefit. That is a different standard than an "incidental" private benefit. If a private benefit is incidental to a public benefit, it is reasonable to assume that the public benefit is greater but the mental gymnastics are unnecessary if the language of the proposed rules is conformed.

Recommended language A public benefit is a benefit that accrues to the public at large rather than to a person, a small group of persons or to a private entity.

A private benefit accrues to a person, small group of persons or to a private entity.

Note prior discussion of a need to define entity.

The projects which offer the greatest public benefits are those which are economically, financially, and technically feasible and contribute to objectives identified in one or more of the Board's five categories for funding.

Board's Proposal

001.4405 Grants for land purchases or easements shall not cause the elimination of the property tax liability.

Comment

The Trust has various requirements concerning payment of real property taxes, in lieu of taxes, or amounts that substitute for either of those payments. A tax liability is the result of the assessment process. In lieu of tax payments or voluntary payments meant to keep a taxing authority whole would not satisfy the requirement to maintain property tax liability. If the objective is to maintain the real property tax base are not the existing requirements sufficient?

Recommended language. Grants for land purchases or easements shall not cause the elimination of responsibilities for payment of real property taxes, in lieu of property taxes or voluntary payments to replace real property taxes.

Board's Proposal

<u>002. ENVIRONMENTAL ACCEPTANCE</u>. A project is considered to be environmentally acceptable when:

Comment

Seemingly the draft relies on the captions to make the whole of the regulation comprehensible. Usually, captions are not considered part of operative text. For purposed of clarity, the following is suggested as a lead sentence. "An application must describe a project that is environmentally acceptable."

If captions are to be a substantive part of the rules a rule to that effect is advisable so the departure from the normal rule will be clearly established.

Board's Proposal

<u>003. CLEAR AND DIRECT ENVIRONMENTAL BENEFITS</u>. A project will be considered to have clear and direct environmental benefits if the realization of those benefits can be reasonably—expected, as a result of the project and if those benefits will be obvious.

Relevant Statute

The grants should assist those projects which provide clear and direct environmental benefits; 81-15,176 (2) (f)

Comment

The statute should be quoted and cited

Seemingly the draft relies on the captions to make the whole of the regulation comprehensible. Usually, captions are not considered part of operative text. For purposes of clarity, the following is suggested as a lead sentence "An application must describe a project that has clear and direct environmental benefits."

If captions are to be a substantive part of the rules a rule to that effect is advisable so the departure from the normal rule will be clearly established.

Board's Proposal

<u>005. PUBLIC BENEFITS</u>. For a project to be eligible for funding assistance, it must produce public, not just private, benefits. <u>The public benefit must be greater than the private benefit. The project must be implemented and completed in Nebraska. Public access is a public benefit.</u>

Relevant Statute

The grants shall not pay for projects which provide primarily private benefits or relieve private liability for environmental damage; 81-15,176 (2) (c)

Comment

This proposal seems derived from 81-15,176 (2) (c). A better approach would be to quote the statute cite it and explain it as necessary and resolve the inconsistency with Chapter 4 001.04 noted earlier.

Board's Proposal

<u>006. FINANCIAL AND TECHNICAL FEASIBILITY</u>. Financial and technical feasibility may be evaluated by the use of subcommittees, contractual assistance or advisory groups. The Standards for each of these factors are as set out below:

Comment

Section 81-15,175 (1) provides for evaluation of financial and technical feasibility and provides for an evaluation of economic feasibility. Economic feasibility should be included in the regulation.

Recommended language Economic Feasibility. A project is economically feasible if projected environmental benefits exceed the anticipated costs. A precise quantification of projected environmental benefits is not necessary. It is necessary to provide a narrative that will allow the reviewer to conclude that the projected environmental benefits exceed the costs.

Board's Proposal

<u>Chapter 4 001. ELIGIBILITY REQUIREMENTS</u>. To be eligible for consideration in the rating processes for funding, the applicant's proposed project must be consistent with the following criteria for eligibility as described in Sections 0021 to 006 of this Chapter.

<u>Chapter 4 006. FINANCIAL AND TECHNICAL FEASIBILITY</u>. Financial and technical feasibility may be evaluated by the use of subcommittees, contractual assistance or advisory groups. The Standards for each of these factors are as set out below:

Comment

The lead provision in Chapter 4 requires a determination that an application is feasible as described in 006. However, it not clear how the feasibility determinations are to be made and their effect. Definitions of financial and technical feasibility are provided. A definition of economic feasibility should be included.

Economic feasibility can be defined as: A project is economically feasible if projected environmental benefits exceed the anticipated costs. A precise quantification of projected environmental benefits is not necessary. It is necessary to provide a narrative that will allow the reviewer to conclude that the projected environmental benefits exceed the costs.

The process for reviewers is not defined and reviewers are not given authority to request additional information they may need to complete a review. To clarify the following the process and to empower reviewers to obtain necessary information.

Recommended language Each member of an advisory group will review all applications submitted to it. The results of the review will be summarized and submitted to the Executive Director in accordance with the calendar established by the Board.

Additional information may be supplied by the applicant at the request any reviewer.

Chapter 5

Board's Proposal

<u>003. REQUIRED FINDINGS</u>. Prior to making any recommendation to the Board for approval of a project for funding eligibility, the Grants Committee shall determine that the project is consistent with the requirements of Chapter 5 of these rules.

Comment

What requirements must be met? The following reg Chap 5 004 requires the committee to "make the recommendations to the Board on project eligibility in accordance with this chapter." 003 is unnecessary but it is there and since it refers to requirements that are not specified and the following rule 004 specifies the requirements. 003 is both ambiguous and unnecessary.

CHAPTER 6

Board's Proposal

<u>001.</u> Pursuant to this Chapter and the factors set forth herein, the Executive Director shall prepare Project Ranking Systems to be used to rank all applications which are eligible. The Project Ranking Systems shall be approved by an affirmative vote of the Board after public hearing. Similarly, any subsequent amendments to a Project Ranking System shall be approved by an affirmative vote of the Board after public hearing.

<u>002.</u> The Project Ranking Systems adopted by the Board shall be used by the Grants Committee for ranking of projects. as described in Chapter 8.

<u>003.</u> <u>RANKING FACTORS</u>. The Project Ranking Systems shall assign a numeric value to each criterion and combine these values into a total score for each application. Each Ranking System shall include, but is not limited to, criteria to evaluate each application to the extent that the project will accomplish the following:

Relevant Statute

The board shall establish rating systems for ranking proposals which meet the board's environmental categories and other criteria. The rating systems shall include, but not be limited to, the following considerations:

- (a) Conformance with categories established pursuant to section 81-15,176;
- (b) Amount of funds committed from other funding sources;
- (c) Encouragement of public-private partnerships;

- (d) Geographic mix of projects over time;
- (e) Cost-effectiveness and economic impact;
- (f) Direct environmental impact;
- (g) Environmental benefit to the general public and the long-term nature of such public benefit; 81-15,175 (2)

Comment

There are repeated references to Project Ranking Systems. Only one system is to be provided so references to systems are not appropriate. The statute should be quoted, cited and an explanation provided for the deviation from its language to make clear there is only one Project Ranking System for each year. The reference to "Each" Ranking System should be amended to refer to a Ranking System and Systems should be revised to read System.

81-15,175(2) contains required elements of a ranking system. Some of the required elements are not described in the proposed regulations; some are. The mix of some but not all can confuse those without a thorough knowledge. There is no reason to create the opportunity for confusion by omitting the statutory requirements.

Board's Proposal

003.062 BE COST EFFECTIVE. Cost effective shall include, as applicable, a comparison of the cost of the project to its expected monetary and non-monetary benefits and whether there is another reasonably available means of accomplishing the same purpose or purposes more economically. A high indirect labor and overhead cost not directly related to the project direct costs is less cost effective than one with a low indirect rate or percentage. Data shall be provided by the applicant detailing the cost effectiveness of all budgeted expenses requested that includes the provided indirect rates.

Comment

The last sentence is mandatory, raising the stakes for understanding its requirement but it is not easily understood. Is data required showing the cost effectiveness of all budgeted expenses? Does the data to be supplied relate only to indirect rates (costs?)? What kind of data is requested? Is it simply a ratio of direct and indirect costs? Are direct and indirect costs different than operating costs and overhead costs? Is there a known standard for identifying direct and indirect costs? If that standard exists, is it readily available to applicants? If a standard exists its text should be included or referenced.

Detailing cost effectiveness is the province of consultants. The cost of the advice or determinations may not be cost effective or economic for small grants.

Board's Proposal

003.073 HAVE ECONOMIC IMPACTS. Economic impacts resulting from the project may be realized in increased real property valuations, mitigation of environmental hazards to the natural physical and biological environment in Nebraska, an improvement of or increase in

habitat, increased recreational opportunities, and other contributions to the wellbeing of the area affected by the project. Data shall be provided by the applicant detailing the proposed economic impacts of the project.

Comment

The last sentence is mandatory. Some potential economic impacts are described in the proposed regulation. Several seem impossible to provide supporting data for. What is the value of increased habitat? Is it an abundance of wildlife? Is it the viewing of abundant wildlife? Is it the harvest of abundant wildlife? Is it all of those and more. Providing data to support those impacts would likely result in more speculation than facts, very high consulting fees and may not be cost effective. The same concerns could be expressed for increased recreational opportunities and other contributions to wellbeing. Being able to conclude that those benefits may be realized is important but supporting that conclusion with data may be impossible, impracticable, speculative, or prohibitively expensive.

The Federal government has experience with these kinds of requirements as applied to environmental issues. Administrative standards and compliance issues can be found with an evaluation of the Federal requirements. Those should be carefully evaluated before imposing anything like them on applicants to the Nebraska Environmental Trust.

Board's Proposal

<u>003.084 PRODUCE DIRECT ENVIRONMENTAL IMPACT. Direct environmental impacts are those changes to the natural, physical, and biological environment caused by the project occurring at the time and in the place the project is carried out.</u>

Comment

Proposed regulation requires coordination with the proposed reg in Chapter 5 003 concerning clear and direct environmental impacts. If the proposed rule is kept it should be amended to require a positive effect.

Board's Proposal

003.406 PROVIDE A PLAN FOR EVALUATING THE RESULTS OF THE EXPENDITURE OF GRANT FUNDS. An applicant shall provide a baseline measurement, the target improvement, and the real time value of the grant investment. The project goals, objectives and outcomes shall identify the tangible and intangible benefits to the public from achieving the objectives.

Comment

It seems the requirement that an applicant describe the status quo or things as they are, describe the improvement or change to the status quo sought, and describe the benefit of change. If that is what is required that is reasonable but as we have advised, a task for writers of rules and regulations is to be informative rather than bewildering. A conscious effort must be made to avoid bureaucratic language. An author who has worked for years with a subject may be writing for themselves when the real audience is not an expert or may not be well informed.

Board's Proposal

<u>003.</u>4107 EVALUATE PERFORMANCE. For prior awarded grantees, awarded in the past three years looking back from the current application cycle, compliance with previous contract

terms is required, including that any prior project was completed on time, quarterly, annual and final reports were submitted on time, no 15 Day Notice for a prior grant contract violation was issued to the grant Sponsor or Applicant.

Comment

It seems prior grantees will be evaluated on past performance as well as the pending grant application. The requirement is for an evaluation of the grant applicant rather than the application. The stature calls for a ranking of grant applications. It is the merits of an idea not the merits of an applicant that is at stake in the grant award process. Performance is an issue for grant administration. For example, imagine an applicant with grants in each of the prior three years. The first was completed with some extra guidance and direction from NET staff the next two were administered without question. What is the current performance evaluation of the applicant if the language of the proposal is applied? Even if the objective is valid the language employed is bureaucratic.

Chapter 9

Board's Proposal

04 "In-kind Match" shall mean the economic value of any non-monetary donated contribution to the development of a project by the applicant or project co-sponsors including but not limited to labor, equipment usage, lands, land rights, facilities or other items essential to the project.

Comment

The definition of "In Kind Match" is deleted. While that phrase may not be used in the text of the revised Title 137 we are aware that grant applications may describe in kind match from partners. Encouragement of public-private partnerships is one of the required rating considerations found in 81-15,175 (2) (c). If not defined in rules and regulations "in kind match" will require definition in some document.

Board's Proposal

<u>05</u>004."PRIMARY, TANGIBLE BENEFITS" shall mean a project's net values, expressed in monetary terms, of increases in products and services and of reductions in costs, damages, or losses of primary beneficiaries

Comment

A definition of "Tangible Primary Benefits" is retained. That phrase is used in Chapter 1 001. As noted in our comment to that section the phrase does not conform to the statutory language and is misleading. The definition should be deleted unless it has some other application.

CONCLUSION

The draft revision of Title 137 should be rejected and a new effort made. The existing rules and regulations do require revision but they do not need to be replaced with a revision having significant deficiencies. More thought and careful drafting is required.

On behalf of the League of Women Voters of Nebraska, I am writing in regard to the proposed changes relating to the adoption of rules and regulations regarding funding, endowment, application, eligibility, evaluation, ranking, awards, administration, and definitions of Nebraska Environmental Trust grants. We are concerned that access to grant funds is not transparent or equitable for eligible groups who propose environmentally beneficial projects in Nebraska. We are seeking clarification on these changes on behalf of groups that apply for funds. We also question the legitimacy of trust money supporting gubernatorial projects when the Governor is able to use the budgeting process for projects.

The LWVUS has advocated for the environment since its inception. We believe that public understanding and cooperation are essential to the responsible and responsive management of our nation's natural resources. The public has a right to know about pollution levels, dangers to health and the environment, and proposed resource management policies and options. The public has a right to participate in decision-making at each phase in the process and at each level of government involvement. Officials should make a special effort to develop readily understandable procedures for public involvement and to ensure that the public has adequate information to participate effectively.

Furthermore, we are concerned that governor's use of NET grant money is taking away from the original intent of the trust, to distribute about \$20 million a year in grants to organizations for wildlife habitat, recycling programs, conservation efforts and environmental-related research. Worthy projects such as the City of Alliance's recycling program, totally funded by NET in the past, are being turned away.

Open and transparent governance and responsible stewardship of our state's resources, natural and fiscal, is important. We echo the concerns of informed groups such as the Friends of the Environmental Trust and organizations that apply for grant money –"why have so many Trust grants been rejected in recent years?" Please create clear eligibility parameters for applicants, award projects that provide a great environmental benefit, and avoid funding relationships with gubernatorial entities.

Dear Director Elmshaeuser and the Nebraska Trust Fund Board members—

On behalf of our Board of Trustees, The Nature Conservancy in Nebraska (TNC) is offering written comments in response to proposed changes to Title 137.

With our comments, we highlight three areas for continued conversation: diminishing conservation funding, confusion around private benefit, and equity concerns around proposed changes.

Chapter 4 (formerly Chapter 5) - Criteria for Eligibility

A 46% rate of ineligibility in proposals submitted in 2022 indicates a severe divide in grantor/grantee understanding and expectation. Indeed, a review of the eligibility scores for TNC proposals made in this period reveals that even internal reviewers disagreed with each other on eligibility.

The private benefit provision stands out as a source of disqualification for a disproportionately high number of proposals in the last grant cycle. Greater clarity here will improve the process for all parties.

Newly introduced language, such as defining what constitutes serious financial hardship begins to address the issue. However, questions remain about private benefit. Definitions should be included to support what constitutes private and public benefit.

New language specifies that public access is a public benefit, but there does not exist similar corroboration that conservation actions taken on private land are in the public interest. In a state such as Nebraska, where upwards of 96% of the land is in private ownership, conservation on private lands—even those without public access—becomes even more critical. Private land conservation ensures access to food, clean drinking water, healthy habitat, and access to nature and open spaces for outdoor recreation, among other public benefits.

In the words of Aldo Leopold, "Conservation will ultimately boil down to rewarding the private landowner who conserves the public interest."

Chapter 5 (formerly Chapter 6) - Evaluating Proposals for Eligibility

If the NET Board continues to make eligibility the first step of a two-step grants process, we request the following actions be incorporated into the rules governing this process:

Either contract a neutral third party to determine eligibility or require openness and transparency of the review committee, naming the participants. If the latter, further requires the following:

- Discussion among reviewers to resolve inconsistencies in their interpretation of eligibility requirements
- Automatic provision of a written statement identifying causes for ineligibility
- Commit to convening pre-grant educational sessions independently for reviewers and applicants to ensure all parties understand the process.

Chapter 6 (formerly Chapter 7) – Project Ranking Systems

Wildlife populations have plummeted by an average of 69% between 1970 and 2018, and Nebraska is no exception to this concerning trend. We have 119 species at risk of local extinction in Nebraska.

Existing resources are insufficient to match the environmental needs of our community. A consortium of land management organizations has identified the availability of funding as among the most pressing issues in the state. Indeed, a recent poll conducted by New Bridge Strategy found that Nebraskans overwhelmingly agree with the conservation community: 4 out of 5 Nebraskans polled say more needs to be done to protect land, water, and wildlife habitat in the state.

Addition of line 005. "No application receiving fewer than twenty-five percent (25%) of the maximum points will be funded" appears reasonable, however, this action codifies not putting conservation dollars to work in our community at the time we need it most. Projects should either be eligible for funding or not. If they are eligible, there is no need to set a minimum score threshold.

Holding back Trust dollars disadvantages community organizations capable of putting good work on the ground in Nebraska. Unfortunately, owing to our rural and expansive landscape, our geography does not support a highly professionalized and sophisticated non-profit sector across the full breadth of the state. Assigning an arbitrary score threshold is likely to penalize individual landowners, smaller organizations, those in more rural areas, or others with less access to skilled grant writers.

Similarly, mandatory data reporting in updated provisions 003.02 "Be cost effective" and 003.03 "Have economic impacts" could present too high a bar for under-resourced organizations unaccustomed to detailing cost-effectiveness and economic impacts. Many questions abound in how to value environmental benefits. This may result in smaller organizations in rural communities not being able to compete effectively for funding.

Chapter 9 – Grant Administration

As a leading conservation organization working around the world, TNC is fortunate to have dedicated administrative support for our grants. Even with this professionalized workforce, recent changes in grants administration at the Nebraska Environmental Trust have proven difficult to manage and will have uneven burden to grant recipients. To this end, we recommend that changes to reporting requirements trigger grantee notification as follows:

There needs to be sufficient notice ahead of changes—no less than a full quarter— to reporting requirements and public education on those changes. Furthermore, application of these changes should only apply to projects newly approved for funding, and not be applied retroactively to multi-year projects mid-stream, as this causes significant hardship for those entities with limited administrative resources.

As an example, the recent limitation of benefits reimbursement to \$5 per hour, this change has a disproportionate impact on lesser advantaged organizations who had initially been funded and budgeted on the promise of full reimbursement on benefits. A change such as this may further have the unintended consequence of discouraging proper compensation among those organizations receiving funds, one reason among many to allow for public input.

Subj: Public comment on proposed changes to Title 137 Rules and Regulations

I write as a citizen, taxpayer, former state and federal fiscal administrator, successful litigant against previous illegal NET actions, farmer and conservationist.

The proposed NET Title 137 regulations are vague and confusing to potential applicants. Unfortunately, the ranking system invites gaming and will result in arbitrary and capricious decisions. The proposed regulations introduce new procedures, not based on statutory authority, which are almost certain to lead to increased conflicts of interest, politicization of the agency, and waste and abuse of taxpayer resources.

It is not clear why the various changes are being proposed. Although the NET webpage makes reference to reports of the State Auditor and Department of Administrative Services, those reports are not linked for the public to review. An NET spokesperson recently suggested the changes were to eliminate duplication. An annotated version of the changes, identifying which provisions are being changed because they are duplicative, as opposed to those that introduce new content and procedures, would help the public understand and evaluate the new regulatory proposal. Without adequate explanation, the public may be led to believe that the proposals are an effort to reduce regulations when in reality they are making major changes.

The new regulations should prescribe Open Meetings Act requirements, so that the public can know how board members evaluate grant applications. Anonymity imbedded in the regulations must be removed from the process at all levels of award consideration, including subcommittees.¹

The regulations should clearly separate the process for determining legal eligibility² from evaluating merit, so that the two are not mixed improperly. Statutory legal eligibility standards are dichotomous while merit is a continuous variable. Combining the two without recognizing the difference is not statistically meaningful and can lead to ranking distortions and legal challenges.

The regulations must not add new factors to the award process that go beyond statutory authority. A proposed new provision³ would require award "consistency...with other state policies...", without further identification of what those policies might be. Potentially this could include legislative or gubernatorial policy preferences through various communications that

may or may not have the force of law and may cause violations of other required administrative procedures. The provision is not only vague, it invites abuse.

Another proposed regulation⁴ would require that "grants for land purchases or easements shall not cause the elimination of the property tax liability." This is vague as to whether any or all amounts of liability would be eliminated and, more problematic, it is not based on statutory authority as witnessed by the fact that land purchases and easements have long been awarded as part of the mission of the Trust. They are among the most effective natural resource protection tools, often sought by farmers and others to protect their investments in essential conservation practices.

The proposed regulations⁵ would eliminate the current language, "Members of the board shall comply with the conflict of interest provisions of the Nebraska Political Accountability and Disclosure Act." This is unwise to eliminate for any purpose and raises the question of whether the intention is to thwart another agency's statutory responsibilities.

If anything, conflict of interest protections should be enhanced to address an actual situation that contributed in the recent past to the aforementioned litigation. Unusually large political contributions to a governor, after an election, from within an industry with a pending NET award application, occurred simultaneously, whereupon the governor's appointees on the NET board voted to make the award. The award (for the benefit of for-profit businesses in the industry) was clearly illegal; only upon the filing of a lawsuit, and the potential for legal discovery, did the NET board withdraw it.

State conflict of interest provisions, which deal with even the appearance of conflicts, must be applied to all parties involved, including the NET board. Clearly, the integrity of state government should not have to depend on citizens who take legal action at their own expense, prevail at court, and then request the court to reimburse attorneys fees from state taxpayers, which the court appropriately did in this case. It should never happen again.

A proposed new provision⁶ that allows members to vote on awards to their own agency if only half goes elsewhere could be an invitation to abuse. The statute⁷ is clear that the award must be "primarily" for other purposes, not for the agency in question, so the share should be well less than half. The new regulations should not suggest the creation of matching fund programs for an agency and its clientele groups.

A proposed new requirement⁸ that "No application receiving fewer than twenty-five percent (25%) of the maximum points will be funded" is vague as to purpose and could easily be gamed to distort rankings, awards, and Trust fund balances. Fund balances have recently become an issue as they are in danger of being transferred for purposes outside the mission and protection of the Trust.

New regulations should be focused on assisting potential applicants understand the purpose and process of NET, and to increase public transparency and accountability. The proposed

regulations should be withdrawn in their entirety and a new set presented to the public, after review by the Attorney General to ensure removal of the above-described problems, as well as many others too numerous to mention. NET was once smooth-running and non-controversial; that should be the goal again.

Written Comment on Title 137 Proposed Changes

Thank you for the opportunity to provide comments to the proposed changes to Title 137. Please see the comments below:


- Public benefit (Chapter 4, 005.) With 96% of the land in Nebraska in private ownership, efforts to improve our environment will not be effective if they only occur on public land. When projects occur on private land, the landowner or operator may receive some private benefits to projects that are designed for public benefit. Sharing the cost with landowners or operators in those instances makes sense and that is what is commonly done. We agree that NET funds should be used on projects to produce public benefits, however, we think it is important to understand that the landowner or operator may provide part of the money for the project if it will benefit their operation financially.
- Serious financial hardship definition (Chapter 4, 001.02) The added definition of "serious financial hardship" to this section is confusing. After talking with NET staff, we understand it to be aimed at entities or organizations that fully rely on NET funds to exist, but it is hard to understand that from the added language. It could be interpreted to mean that any private landowner or operator would not be able to receive any benefits if they had a profitable year.
- Funds accessible to small organizations. NET applications have become increasingly harder to complete in recent years. The proposed changes in Title 137 solidify some of the additional documentation that has been required on applications and it adds in more documentation that will have to be submitted. If NET applications are difficult to complete, only large organizations will be able to apply for the funds because small organizations, like the Sandhills Task Force, will not have the resources to provide all of the data required. Chapter 6, 003.02 adds language to require data to be provided on cost-effectiveness.

Chapter 6, 003.03 adds language to ask for data to be provided on economic impacts that are very challenging to determine. Please consider the impacts to small organizations as requirements are added.

• Evaluate performance (Chapter 6, 003.11) Please consider that a lot of things have changed in the last couple of years regarding how NET has functioned. The Sandhills Task Force has been a long-time awardee of NET funds, but we have struggled a couple of times to understand the new rules. We hope that it will be considered if this new rule takes place.

Please accept this letter as formal testimony from the Upper Republican Natural Resources District (URNRD) pertaining to proposed amendments to Title 137, Chapters 1-10. We appreciate your efforts to review and improve rules regarding several aspects of Nebraska Environmental Trust (NET) grants.

The URNRD encompasses three counties in southwest Nebraska that have a substantial amount of irrigated cropland. As such, we focus much of our attention on groundwater quality and quantity with measures including limits on volumes of water that can be used for irrigation and regulatory actions to prevent unacceptable levels of groundwater contaminants.

Our interpretation of the current rules is that groundwater quality, not quantity, is an NET-eligible funding category. By eliminating the funding categories, which we understand would be accomplished by the proposed rules, funding for projects solely or primarily focused on groundwater quantity would be allowed. We generally believe this is an improvement over the current rules but would rather have groundwater quantity added to the existing list of funding categories.

We also support the proposed elimination, in Chapter 4, of the current rule limiting the percentage of NET funding that can be used for soil or groundwater remediation to 60%. Decisions on how to direct NET funding, we believe, should be based solely on the merits and environmental benefit of proposed projects with attention to fair geographic distribution of NET funds.

Following are proposed changes that, as we interpret them, we urge you to reconsider:

• Chapter 4 contains a proposal that grants for land purchases or easements not cause elimination of property tax liability. Our organization relies on property taxes for operations so we are sensitive to actions that erode the tax base. However, the proposal would essentially prevent government entities such as the URNRD from purchasing property or easements using NET funds. This is because political subdivisions of the state such as the URNRD are constitutionally prohibited from paying property taxes. There are a relatively small number of statutory exemptions that allow some government entities, for specific types of land/easement purchases, to pay in-lieu of property taxes. However, even for these entities and the specific types of land ownership that allow them to pay in-lieu of taxes, it's possible that they would not comply with the proposed rule because such payments, which are sometimes voluntary, may not legally be considered "elimination" of property tax liability. Purchasing land and/or easements is a rarely used but important tool for our NRD to conserve or repurpose groundwater and can help maintain the long-term property tax base of an area by prolonging the time in which water is available.

• Chapter 8 contains a proposal, as we understand it, that would not allow equipment purchased with NET funding to be used after the term of the grant contract. We read this to mean, for example, that if NET funding were used to purchase a grass drill as part of a larger NET project to re-establish native grass on a piece of property the drill would have to be sold after completion of the restoration project. Such a rule seems to assume that after project completion the equipment would have a larger public benefit, and one that would more align with NET objectives, if it was in the hands of an entity other than the one that completed the public project. It seems that the opposite would be more likely - an entity that completed a project with environmental benefit to the public would be more likely to complete another public project in the future using the NET-funded equipment than an unknown buyer of the equipment.

Thank you for your consideration of our suggestions and we wish you well in your revision of NET rules. We have used the fund in the past and it is a great asset for the state.

I am writing to express my support for the proposed changes in the rules for the Environmental Trust. From my point of view it looks like this is an important necessary change to promote accountability in the grant recipients and for the Environmental Trust board. Further, when a state audit and performance assessment recommended changes in the regulations it is apparent changes were needed.

In section 009.03 under 010 the addition of full board approval is common sense. The director should not have the sole ability for approval of grant amendments. The addition of this rule seems to point out that there was abuse of this grant amendment by the director in the past. Also Rule 009.03 under 011 seems to imply that grant recipients were abusing the terms of the grant. Why would anyone support grants that were not used solely for the purpose of the grants?

It again becomes very apparent that grant recipients were abusing grants from the Trust when you have to add rules such as 003.07. How can the Environmental Trust be considered reliable and accountable to the public if they ever award more grants to recipients that do not comply with grants they already received. I personally would like the permanent disqualification of non-compliant grant recipients.

I would also like to commend the board for the addition of 001.05 concerning property taxes. Landowners like myself are struggling with the high property taxes in Nebraska. I have seen land acquisition by groups that pay little or no tax hurt communities in our state. This was also a major concern brought to my attention when I worked on the Strategic Planning committee for Nebr. Game and Parks Wildlife Management Areas.

I am very concerned with the addition of the wording in 005. The addition that the projects must be completed in Nebraska leads me to the conclusion that Trust money was spent outside of the state. If this is true, it shows how vitally important these rule changes are to keep the Environmental Trust accountable to the people of Nebraska.

I understand there is opposition to these changes. This is to be expected when groups have had their way with the Trust in the past. They are clinging to the easy money and lax policies that have been in place.

Please move forward immediately with these rule changes to bring the Trust back into compliance with state statutes and with common sense.



EXPLANATION

The NET has had a contract with Gregoire Consulting, Inc. since 2011. In 2017 the software was significantly upgraded in collaboration with Design Studio at UNL through the Jeffrey S. Raikes School of Computer Science and Management. This is a sole source contract and documentation is provided to the Nebraska Game & Parks procurement office. NET has a substantial investment in this software.

PROPOSAL

STATE OF NEBRASKA ENVIRONMENTAL TRUST SERVICES AGREEMENT

This Agreement is between the <u>Nebraska Environmental Trust</u>, hereinafter called the Trust, and <u>Gregoire Consulting</u>, Inc., hereinafter called the Contractor.

WITNESSETH: The Trust seeks to engage the Contractor for maintenance services on the system entitled "<u>Grants Management System</u>". The work will be performed beginning <u>July 1, 2023</u>, and ending <u>June 30, 2024</u>. This contract is awarded subject to the provisions and conditions contained in this Agreement:

1. CONSIDERATIONS

The Contractor shall be paid by the Trust a total not to exceed \$28,800 for maintenance services for the duration of the Agreement. Pricing is based on a monthly service fee of \$2,400 for each of the 12 months in the duration of the agreement. Contractor will submit an invoice each month at the beginning of the month. Payment will be made contingent upon receipt of an invoice by the Trust of the products and services.

2. CONTRACTOR'S SERVICES

The Contractor shall provide the following services:

Gregoire Consulting, Inc. will provide support of the existing software for the Nebraska Environmental Trust Grants Portal as directed by the staff of the Environmental Trust. Development of new software features can be provided by amendment to this agreement.

This agreement does not cover Amazon Web Services charges for hosting the Environmental Trust Systems.

3. CONTRACTOR'S AGENTS

It is understood that the services provided herein shall be performed by Contractor or its agent or agents.

4. DURATION OF THE AGREEMENT

This agreement will begin July 1, 2023, and end June 30, 2024. This Agreement will remain in effect for the term prescribed above unless sooner terminated for cause by the Trust or unless sooner terminated by either party. If terminated for cause by the Trust, or if terminated by the Contractor or by mutual consent, there shall be not less than (30) days written notice, unless otherwise mutually agreed. This Agreement may be renewed, extended or amended by mutual written agreement.

5. FORFEITURE OF AGREEMENT

Failure of the Contractor to comply with the terms and conditions of this Agreement in a manner which the Trust, in its sole discretion, shall deem sufficient may be considered cause for termination. Failure of the Trust to terminate upon apprehension of a violation shall not constitute a bar to termination upon repetition of the same violation or of another violation. In the event of any forfeiture or termination of this Agreement any research data, supplies, interim reports, or other product of the Contractor's efforts hereunder shall be delivered to the Trust.

6. SPECIAL PROVISIONS

Nothing in this agreement shall be construed as a delegation of authority of the Trust to the Contractor or its agent(s) with respect to the Agreement described herein, nor shall the Contractor or its agent(s) in any manner consider or represent itself to be an employee of the Trust. It is expressly understood by the Contractor that it is, in all instances, an independent contractor who shall provide, manage, and assume all obligations whatsoever which may occur or be required by the Workmen's Compensation laws of any state, Old Age and Survivors Insurance, Internal Revenue Acts, Income Tax of any state, and laws and regulations relating thereto, and the Contractor shall save and hold harmless the Trust against any obligation relating to any such liability.

Under Federal and/or state law, this Agreement and Contractor must not discriminate in employment on this specific agreement performance on the basis of race, color, religion, sex, age, gender, marital status, national origin, disability or political affiliation. The Contractor agrees to abide by the Nebraska Fair Employment Practices Act as provided by Neb. Rev. Stat. Sections 48-1101 through 48-1126, and the Americans with Disabilities Act of 1990 (P.L. 101-366) as implemented by 28 C.F.R. 3, which are made a part of and included in this Agreement by reference. The Contractor shall comply with fair labor standards as required in Neb. Rev. Stat. §§ 73-102, 73-104 through the term of this Agreement.

The Contractor agrees to have in place, during the Agreement period, a Drug-Free Workplace Policy stating that the unlawful manufacture, distribution, dispensation, possession, or use of a controlled substance in the workplace is prohibited. The Contractor agrees to provide a copy of its drug-free workplace policy at any time upon request by the Trust.

The Contractor warrants that its officers, stockholders, associates and employees presently have no known financial interest and shall not acquire any known financial interest, direct or indirect, which would conflict in any manner or degree with the performance of the services required by this Agreement. The Contractor shall comply with the provisions of the laws of the State of Nebraska which require disclosure for conflict-of-interest determinations of amounts received under this Agreement.

The Contractor certifies by signing this agreement that neither the Contractor nor its principals are presently debarred, suspended, proposed for debarment, declared ineligible or voluntarily excluded by any federal or state department or agency from participating in transactions. The Contractor also agrees to include the above requirements in any and all subcontracts into which it enters. The Contractor shall immediately notify the Trust if, during the term of this agreement, the Independent Contractor becomes debarred. The Trust may immediately terminate this

Agreement by providing the Contractor written notice if contractor becomes debarred during the term of this Agreement.

7. LIABILITY

It is expressly understood that the Contractor assumes full liability for the acts of its employees, agents, and officers assigned to perform the Contractor's duties hereunder, and shall reimburse the Trust for any damage to Trust property, real or personal, which may be damaged by the Contractor, its employees, agents or officers.

8. MISCELLANEOUS PROVISIONS

- a. This agreement shall be considered to have been executed at Lincoln, Lancaster County, Nebraska, and shall be subject to the laws of the State of Nebraska. The Nebraska State Contract Claims Act is the exclusive remedy for resolving contract claims against the State.
- b. The Contractor is required and hereby agrees to use a federal immigration verification system to determine the work eligibility status of new employees physically performing services within the State of Nebraska. A federal immigration verification system means the electronic verification of the work authorization program authorized by the Illegal Immigration Reform and Immigrant Responsibility Act of 1996, 8 U.S.C. 1324a, known as the E-Verify Program, or an equivalent federal program designated by the United States Department of Homeland Security or other federal agency authorized to verify the work eligibility status of a newly hired employee.
- c. This Agreement may not be assigned except with the written consent of the Trust.



I am writing regarding the Nebraska Youth Conservation Initiative being carried out by Beyond School Bells (BSB), an initiative of the Nebraska Children and Families Foundation (NCFF). Our project was awarded a three-year grant from the Nebraska Environmental Trust to NCFF in the fall of 2020 to support Environmental Design Studio work and the BSB Conservation Management Internship. NCFF is a Lincoln-based, statewide organization that creates public-private partnerships and provides grants to communities and advocates for policy change to enhance services aimed at supporting students and families and ensuring success in school and in life. We work closely with partners in state government, local communities, and other public and private sectors to leverage resources to support activities that promote student success. BSB, a program of NCFF, is Nebraska's statewide afterschool and summer learning network.

Nebraska Environmental Trust (NET) grant funds have been critical to support BSB's Environmental and Conservation education work. Through this project, we have been able to create multiple afterschool programs for students ranging from elementary to high school, enable students to grow hundreds of pounds of produce for schools and community members, and have introduced various environmental education projects to thousands of Nebraska youth. BSB's growing interest in promoting outdoor and environmental education projects has benefited tremendously from our partnership with NET and this extension will help us continue what we see as our important, long-term work in this area.

We are seeking a six-month extension on this contract to continue this work in response to unforeseen delays due to Covid-19 and the many impacts it had on the afterschool programs we work with and the students they serve. The pandemic's impact beginning in 2020 caused many delays in our programming. The first few months of the pandemic resulted in very little connection to students as most programs were not in session, so BSB pivoted to create at-home activities like the Environmental Scavenger Hunt via virtual Design Studios. These materials were well-received, but on a limited basis due to the new and widening disconnect between programs and their students and

families as most engagement was virtual. As afterschool programs began to return with severe restrictions in 2021, they were dramatically understaffed, had limited capacity to carry out programming, and had many new safety protocols to follow. Many of our partners did continue to provide afterschool learning opportunities and found great value in outdoor education as a safe place for youth engagement. This was a great success of the Nebraska Youth Conservation Initiative and the products of the Design Studios. Many programs were able to participate in the 2021 Summer of Innovation where BSB supported 15 outdoor and environmental projects. However, this success was accompanied by yet another challenge as programs, staff, and students were on-and-off due to outbreaks and student groups were often isolated to limit potential spread. The staff of these programs were quickly overwhelmed with many stressors within and outside of programs.

These challenges continued and further evolved in the 2021-22 school year as many industries faced a staffing crisis. Afterschool programs were no exception. Virtually every program BSB worked with faced challenges with staffing both in number of employees as well as with the reliability and experience of those who were available as many programs had to hire new staff after so many volunteers and part time staff decided to retire during the pandemic. Each of these factors led to a limited ability to carry out new programming and especially impacted the ability of programs to connect students to opportunities outside of their school grounds. The availability of vaccines in early to mid-2022 were long-awaited, and their impact was noticeable, but not immediate. Vaccines meant that programs might once again be able to host partners and potentially visit offcampus connections, but these afterschool staples, did not return all at once. Programs had to go through a long process of approving the re-establishment of these facets and once approved, had to re-engage and initiate partnerships. BSB assisted this process in the spring and summer of 2022, but uncovered challenges and hesitancy of youth to engage beyond what had become a much smaller comfort zone. We saw this in our own programming, student staffing initiatives, many of our partner's programs, and especially in the Conservation Management Internship. Despite having plans in place and attempts to engage students prior to the internship, BSB had to cancel the 2022 internship. In light of this challenge, we pivoted to day trips and weekend trips that students would be more comfortable with and found some early success later that summer and fall.

Over the course of the 2022-23 school year, many of the above challenges have begun to subside, but have not dissipated all-together and many have simply evolved. BSB and our program partners continue to see the challenges the pandemic created as the trauma looms over students and families and the programs that serve them. These challenges impacted both main strands of the Nebraska Youth Conservation Initiative: Design Studio activities and pilots were limited; and the Conservation Management internship was entirely prevented in 2020, 2021, and severely restricted in 2022. BSB has responded to each of these challenges with unique approaches like creating a model of student-driven food system programming where Design Studio activities were possible and with new partnerships and more locally accessible conservation career experiences.

We have and continue to work diligently to overcome these challenges, however, they ultimately restricted our spending in 2020, 2021, and 2022. We believe that a 6-month extension will allow us to continue to build on the momentum of emerging from the pandemic, creating new partnerships, and building new experiences for students across the state. We have plans in place for local conservation experiences in April, May, and June as well as the return of the full internship June 4th through the 16th with our traditional and many new partners. Design Studio work surrounding Food Systems will also be making a significant step forward this summer as the Freight Farm project continues to engage more high school students at Bay High, Lincoln Northeast, Lincoln Science Focus Program, and others. The work of these students will tightly correspond with many other food systems pilots this spring and summer. The 6-month extension will allow BSB to ensure that each of these projects continues through the second half of summer and transitions successfully into the fall of the 2023 school year. If approved, BSB would continue to coordinate local Conservation Experiences and partnerships and carry out Design Studio pilot work to complete the project as proposed.

For all of us at BSB and NCFF, it has been our pleasure and honor to work with you and your colleagues at the Nebraska Environmental Trust, and it is my hope that we can continue to work together on this important effort to connect Nebraska's youth with the environment and natural resources around them.

The University of Nebraska Lincoln requests a no cost extension for the above referenced project under the direction of Dr. Xu Li until June 30, 2024.

In the 2022-2023 project year, we resolved the moisture issue that caused GFRI breakers to trip in the previous project year and was able to operate the conductive concrete (CC) slab in the field as designed. We conducted the first round of field testing on cattle manure in Fall 2022 and the test lasted for about 25 days. We see great pathogen removal in the manure pile sitting on the CC slab. However, we did not see significant advantage of the CC slab over conventional stockpiling in terms of preserving nutrient in manure. After carefully examining the data, we discover that the relatively short duration of the field test was not long enough to cause significant nutrient loss in the control manure stockpile. We are planning to start a second round of field testing in April or May this year and run the field testing for 2-3 months. The manure samples collected from this round of testing will be analyzed in the weeks after the field test. With longer duration similar to what happens in real practice, we expect to see significant nutrient loss in the control manure stockpile and insignificant nutrient loss (i.e., good nutrient retention) in the treatment manure pile sitting on the CC slab.

In addition to the nutrient analyses proposed in the original proposal, we plan to also monitor the methanogens in the manure sitting on the CC slab in the next round of field testing. Methanogens in manure are responsible for methane generation, and methane emissions from manure could account for ~15% of the methane emission over the entire life cycle of cattle production. If the CC slab can inactivate methanogens in manure (like it did on pathogens), the technology will reduce methane emissions from manure and improve the environmental sustainability for the beef industry.

The Nebraska Pharmacists Association, on behalf of the Nebraska MEDS Coalition, is pleased to inform you that the work for Grant Project #19-104 is being performed on time, and the project is on track. While the project is progressing well, we respectfully request an extension of the grant period to June 30, 2024.

In 2022, over 34,000 pounds of unwanted medications were diverted from Nebraska landfills and out of our water supply with over 200,000 pounds of leftover medications collected since the program's inception. We had expected to finish this grant this winter/spring through a combination of several large prescribed fire projects in the Sandstone Prairies Biologically Unique Landscape (BUL)/Southeast Prairies BUL in southeast Nebraska and mechanical tree clearing projects in Verdigris-Bazile and other BULs in northeast Nebraska. The Bow Creek Watershed Project (20-175) has had a productive two and a half years, accomplishing many goals and objectives. Many of Goal One objectives and tasks (hire and train a project coordinator, and develop criteria for an up-front cost-share program) have been completed. Goal Two activities (educate and inform ag producers, resource managers, public officials, community leaders, youth, and other private citizens through public outreach) have been popular and continue to be the heart of the program. Goal Three (install and implement BMPs and other identified activities which reduce or treat internal and external pollutant loads) is ongoing and has reached several milestones.

It has been exciting to see demonstration farms and mentoring groups develop over the project life. Even with the completion of some of the goals and tasks, Covid-19 in-person restrictions delayed the implementation of portions of the mentoring and demo farm activities early in the project. Rocky Mountain Bird Observatory dba Bird Conservancy of the Rockies is requesting a timeline extension of grant number 21-205-2, Connecting Youth and Families to the Natural World in the Nebraska Panhandle until December 31, 2023. The current end date is June 30, 2023. Extending the funds six months will allow us to deliver our transformational fall bird banding station programs that fulfill grant objectives detailed in our award 21-205-2.

The Wildcat Hills and Chadron State Park bird banding stations have made great impacts for both bird conservation and education. To date, the Wildcat Hills and Chadron State Park bird banding stations have reached over 10,000 students and adults and banded 12,053 birds of 104 species in 16 years.

Each year, 400 students and adults visit the banding stations to learn about Nebraska songbirds, discover new career opportunities and learn about bird conservation. As one teacher put it, "We talk about bird banding and migration in Science. Going to the bird banding station allows us to bring this information into action and students gain not just the knowledge but also the experience." 

The purpose of this letter is to request a 12 month, no-cost extension on grant application 20-189-3. This research project focused on identifying factors that facilitate or constrain Nebraska farmers and farmland owners' willingness to adopt precision agriculture and targeted conservation practices. To complete this project, we hired 2 graduate students: Morgan Register and Corrin Winter. Ms. Register surveyed a group of Nebraska conservation specialists and identified that many participants are using precision agriculture practices in their conservation positions. However, Ms. Register's research also identified important communication gaps amongst participants regarding these new agricultural technologies. Ms. Winter's conducted a complimentary study that built on the idea of communication gaps by surveying >7,500 farmers and farmland owners' across Nebraska. Her research identified important barriers to their willingness to adopt precision agriculture and targeted conservation practices. These two research projects also elucidated the need for increased training opportunities, and improved communication and engagement between conservation specialists and farmland owners' across Nebraska.

While each of the complementary components of this study were successful, we are missing a critical part of the original research proposal— conducting focus groups and/or semi-structured interviews with Nebraska farmers and farmland owners'. We originally planned to use a mixed-methods approach that combined the findings from the graduate research projects with focus groups and/or semi-structured interviews, but due in part to University travel restrictions, we were unable to complete these interviews. Furthermore, two of the original principal investigators on this project left the University during this study. With current University personnel, we believe the focus groups and/or semi-structured interviews will improve our understanding of the limitations, and potential solutions to increase precision agriculture and targeted conservation adoption across Nebraska.

The current balance is \$107,545. There will be no change in the project's approved scope of work. We will utilize these funds to conduct focus groups and/or semi-structured interviews of Nebraska farmers and farmland owners', which covers personnel, travel, supplies, transcription services, and analytical software licenses.

Long Pine Creek Watershed (LPCW) NET Phase 3 (20-104) and Phase 4 (21-133) Extension Request Handout

The Middle Niobrara Natural Resources District (MNNRD) is providing this handout to supplement the Extension Letter of Request and to assist with the explanation of factors that have led to considerable impacts and delays to the final completion of the Phase 3 and Phase 4 projects in the LPCW.

Permitting

• The projects faced challenges with the permitting process, review, and approval timeline

Final Design

• The delay of USACE permitting compounded with the intricacies of a constantly changing stream corridor and volatile market led to delays in the final design of Phase 3 and Phase 4, which occurred in December 2022.

Invitation To Bid and Pre-Bid Meeting

- The Invitation To Bid both projects was advertised from the beginning of December 2022 to the beginning of February 2023.
- MNNRD and Houston Engineering attempted to host Pre-Bid Meetings on December 16th, 2022, at both project locations, but these were canceled due to high snow amounts and blizzarding conditions.
- With such high snowfall and the future forecast of negative daytime/nighttime temperatures, MNNRD and Houston Engineering decided to host the Pre-Bid Meeting virtually on January 13th, 2023.

Bid Letting

• On February 8th, 2023, the MNNRD received three bids from three different contractors, all of which were 29% - 50% higher than the original estimated costs when designs were completed, and permits was issued.

Second Final Design

• Houston Engineering modified and finalized the design (February 2023 – March 2023) to work with the low bid contractor, adjusting final quantities and subsequent costs to remain within the available funding, while still implementing a successful project.

Pre-Construction Meeting

 After a month of trying to meet everyone's schedules, Houston Engineering, MNNRD, & Landowner(s), were finally able to have a Pre-Construction Meeting in April 2023 at both project locations.

Construction/Implementation Impacts

- One of the biggest and most concerning impacts is the supply and demand of rock riprap. The closest quarry does not think they will be able to keep up with the demand of the large amount of rock riprap these projects need in the short amount of time available. If the contractor had to use an alternative quarry, several more hours away, it would add an additional \$100,000 to these projects with the cost of riprap, travel, delivery, etc.
- Harsh winter weather conditions and snowpack, which rendered the sites
 inaccessible for extended periods of time, delayed the construction start date. the
 selected low bid contractor was not able to begin work as soon as they would have
 liked to render the site accessible for an extended period of time.

Progress

• Both projects are currently underway with a goal of being finished by the last day of June 2023. An extension for both Phase 3 and Phase 4, would allow the contractor more time to sufficiently and adequately utilize their time and resources to successfully implement the projects. It would also give the contractor more room if Brown County, NE receives a heavy dose of rain and/or snow this spring/early summer that would impact site access and workability.

Improving Statewide Performance of Conservation Investments on Eastern Redcedar Invasions

Request for a no-cost extension submitted to the Nebraska Environmental Trust

Original project timeline: 1 June 2020 through 30 June 2023

- Length of additional time required to complete project objectives:
 - A one-year no-cost extension is requested to complete project objectives.
- Justification for the extension:
 - A candidate was recruited and on track to start employment on June 1, 2020, however, a university-wide hiring freeze, due to the COVID-19 pandemic, prevented hiring of key personnel for this grant and delayed spending for the project. An exemption from the university hiring freeze was eventually granted for this position in 2021, which resulted in the hiring of the current coordinator on May 1, 2021.
 - The requested one-year no-cost extension provides necessary time to build on accomplishments from the previous two years and complete the project's remaining objectives (please see below for a summary of project objectives and their status).
- Summary of project achievements and status for objectives:
 - Objective 1 Summary: Environmental monitoring technologies developed by Twidwell and his team have been adopted by multiple Nebraska partners spanning agriculture and conservation. Nationally, every major conservation group in the Great Plains has adopted these new technologies as tools for large-scale conservation planning. These products, due to a partnership with other universities/states to make rangeland technologies more freely available, have been released on the USDA-NRCS Working Lands for Wildlife website (https://www.wlfw.org). These products are serving as key tools for partner engagement and more strategic planning throughout the Great Plains. The one-year no-cost extension will allow the coordinator and science team to transition these products to an online Rangeland Informatics platform, that will be hosted in Dirac Twidwell's lab at the University of Nebraska. The site will add additional products to better support planning for woody encroachment in grasslands.
 - Objective 2 Summary: Through extensive coordination and engagement, the Nebraska Great Plains Grassland Initiative (NE GPGI) has emerged as rallying point for collaborative agricultural/wildlife conservation partnerships in Nebraska to advance technically-sound and science-backed delivery of programs and conservation expenditures. This initiative, in tandem with Twidwell's vulnerability guide, have led to massive adoption of new principles

for managing woody encroachment. Partnerships for this effort include (but are not limited to) Nebraska NRCS, Nebraska Cattlemen, Pheasants Forever, USDA-NRCS Working Lands for Wildlife, Nebraska Prescribed Fire Council, Sandhills Task Force, Loess Canyons Rangeland Alliance, Rainwater Basin Joint Venture, Nebraska Grazing Lands Coalition, Nebraska Game and Parks Commission, U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service, U.S. Forest Service, The Nature Conservancy, Nebraska Department of Environment and Energy, Maddux Cattle Company, Cooksley Ranch, and the University of Nebraska Extension. Together, these partnerships represent capacity for improved statewide management of eastern redcedar invasions. The one-year no-cost extension will allow the coordinator funded by this project to build upon these partnerships and further integrate new principles for addressing woody encroachment with the delivery of conservation programs. The coordinator is currently working on a field training handbook that will be the first product to integrate new management principles with the conservation planning process used to deliver conservation investments on rangelands.

- Objective 3 Summary: Twidwell and Fogarty have developed a vulnerability guide that now serves as the national standard for identifying best management practices to solve the woody encroachment problem. To date, over 21,000 copies have been requested, printed, and distributed to conservation partners throughout the Great Plains. The one-year no-cost extension will allow us to meet the increased demand by Nebraska partners to develop materials for workshops and trainings, which have been funded by other grants relevant to the mission of this NET award.
- Objective 4 Summary: We have documented improved management outcomes in areas of Nebraska that have been key recipients of NET-investments for eastern redcedar control. Importantly, our new guidance is estimated to save \$25-500 per acre compared to past guidance, allowing Nebraska partners to more efficiently manage woody encroachment, increase the acres they are managing, and better prevent re-invasion after initial restoration treatments. Additional documented outcomes include the stabilization of grassland landscapes that were transitioning toward woody dominance, increased rangeland production, and the prevention of rangeland agricultural losses. The one-year no-cost extension will provide the coordinator and science team to develop a long-term strategy to continue tracking the outcomes of state investments on eastern redcedar and other invading woody plants for Nebraska partners.
- Objective 5 Summary: We have built an external mass communications team that includes core representation from Nebraska Game and Parks Commission, Nebraska Department of Environment and Energy, Nebraska Grazing Lands Coalition, Backyard Farmer, USDA-NRCS Working Lands for Wildlife, and Rainwater Basin Joint Venture. This effort has resulted in over 90 communications products to better communicate the threat of woody

encroachment and success of new conservation strategies. Communication outlets include National Geographic, Omaha World Herald, BEEF Magazine, Discover Magazine, Wired Magazine, Pheasants Forever Journal, Nebraskaland, Progressive Farmer, Audobon Magazine, The Fence Post, Backyard Farmer, Farmers.gov, Lincoln Journal Star, and the Wildlife Management Institute's Bulletin. Original articles produced through this effort have been reprinted or shared in over 30 local media outlets in Nebraska such as the North Platte Post and Sandhills Express. The one-year no-cost extension will allow the coordinator to continue to build on the above achievements and highlight examples of progress in grassland conservation.

Dear Nebraska Environmental Trust,

The Middle Niobrara NRD's and its partners are writing to you today to request a one (1) year extension and a modification of funds for grant 20-150-3: Sandhills Interactive Natural Resources Educational Complex (SINREC). While the project has hit numerous goals, objectives, and public benefits during the 3-year grant period, unavoidable situations have kept the project from capitalizing on all the NET funds and In-Kind match.

NET Grant 20-150-1 (SINREC) began in June of 2019 and was full steam ahead until COVID struck in March of 2020. This project has a large cast of supporting members from many different public and private organizations and meeting project timelines because of social distancing and policy restrictions became extremely difficult. Projects slated for Year 1 were not completed until Year 2 and projects projected for completion in Year 2 were pushed to Year 3. Even through the delays, the project was able to develop most of the key parts for the outdoor education center as well as the start of design and content development for the indoor center. Equipment and learning materials have been acquired and the project is nearly ready to begin holding regular outdoor training courses and to dive into the further development of the indoor center.

The main reason for requesting the modification and extension is to utilize the funds set aside for a Project Coordinator and to continue the work of Heartland Scenic Studios on the indoor education center. Funds were budgeted starting in year 2 for two full-time project coordinators and educators. With the delays due to COVID we found no luck in hiring a project coordinator, as everyone is familiar with the extreme difficulty of hiring employees post-COVID. A full-time coordinator and educator will better facilitate the development of the indoor education center and Phase 2 of the project. Heartland Scenic Studios is starting to wrap up the initial design, but still has a long road ahead to final creation and implementation. Last September's SINREC Phase 2 application, which was for the final development, creation, and installation of the indoor educational center with Heartland, was unfortunately denied. Phase 2 is the second step of the current SINREC 20-150-1:3 grant and if approved, would have brought this project to near completion of the original design from 2019. Approval of this extension and modification would immensely help this project meet initial goals and deliverables, as well as long term project goals stretching into portions of Phase 2. The MNNRD and its partners would greatly appreciate another year to utilize these funds to forge ahead on this innovative project. We would also like to again extend invitations to come visit the project and see all the exciting things coming together, as it is hard to put into words and a few pictures the immensity of this project.



This property may not be sold, leased, transferred, exchanged, mortgaged or encumbered in any manner, or used for purposes Inconsistent with the grant without the prior written approval of the Nebraska Environmental Trust, P.O. Box 94913 - Lincoln, NE 68509-4913.

In the grant contract between NET and the Northern Prairies Land Trust: J. TRANSFER/DISPOSAL OF REAL OR PERSONAL PROPERTY - The Sponsor will not sell, lease, transfer, exchange, mortgage or encumber in any manner whatsoever all or any portion of any real (including land acquisitions, easements or improvements) or other property acquired in whole, or in part, by Trust funds without the prior written permission of the Trust, which will not be unreasonably withheld. The Sponsor shall notify the Trust in writing of any proposed sale, lease, transfer, exchange, mortgage or encumbrance at least thirty days in advance and obtain written approval from the Trust. In the event that the Trust does not agree to the sale, lease, transfer, exchange, mortgage or encumbrance of said property, the Sponsor may repay the value of the grant to the Trust and is released from all further obligations. Otherwise repayment will be calculated according to the adopted policies of the Trust board regarding the transfer or sale of Trust funded equipment. The Sponsor will notify the Trust when any equipment purchased in whole or in part with grant funds is no longer usable during the service life of the equipment.

PROPOSAL

The proposed amended language in Title 137 would require property taxes to continue.

005. Any grant contract which includes the transfer or acquisition of real property which is taxable before such transfer or acquisition shall specify a mechanism to address the continued payment of property taxes or payments in lieu of property taxes.

EXPLANATION

F. Payment of Tax on Real Property

The Nebraska Environmental Trust recognizes the importance of maintaining the property tax base to local communities. All government grantees are required to pay taxes or payments in-lieu of taxes in accordance with applicable state or federal laws on real property acquired with Trust funding. All private grantees, for-profit or non-profit, are required to pay property taxes on real property acquired with Trust funding in full in perpetuity.

Grants issued for the purpose of acquiring title to real property to a grantee(s) which does not have the statutory ability to pay property taxes shall be accompanied by a one time payment to the county (ies) affected. The payment shall be 15 (fifteen) times the amount of the total property tax due in the last calendar year, less the levy amount which would have been due to the grantee(s).
